Smedley, advile, that the Dutch fleet, confitting of 19 fail, large and imall, failed from the lexel the 8th or July; that the city of Geneva had opened her gates to the troops of France and Swoy; that the French neet had arrived at Breit, with 18 fail of Newfound and and british merchantmen, pr zes, and, it is faid, a 50 gun ship; that the prospect of peace which dawned for a moment, was totally lost in a more vigorous preparation for war.

His Britannie majefty's speech to both houses of parliament, on Thursday, July 11, 1782.

My lords and gentlemen,

THE unwearied affidulty with which you have perfevered in the dicharge of your duty in parliament, during to long a teffion, bears the most honourable testimony of your zeal and industry in the fervice of the public; for which you have provided with the clearest differnment of its true interests; anxiously opening every channel for the return of peace; and furnishing w th no lets vigitance the means or carrying on the war, it that meature thould be unavoidable.

The extentive powers with which I find myfelf invested to treat for reconciliation and amity with the colonies which have taken arms in North-America, I shall continue to employ in the manner most conducive to the attainment of those objects, and with an earnestness

furtable to their importance.

The real which my fubjects in Ireland have expressed for the public fervice, thews that the liberality of your proceedings towards them is felt there as it ought; and has engaged their affections, equally with their duty

and interests in the common caule. The diligence and ardour with which you have tered upon the confideration of the British interests in the East-Indies, are worthy of your widom, juilice, and humanity. To protect the persons and fortunes of millions in those distant regions, and to combine our prosperity with their happiness, are objects which am-

ply repay the utmost labour and exertion.

Gentlemen of the bouse of commons, I return you my particular thanks for the very liberal fupplies which you have granted with to much cheerfulnels and zeal for the fervice of the current year. I reflect with extreme regret upon the heavy expence which the circumitances of public affairs unavoidably call for. It shall be my care to husband your means to the neil advantage; and, as far as depends on me, to apply that economy which I have endeavoured to fet on toot in my civil establishment, to those more ex-tensive branches of public expenditure, in which still more important advantages may be expected.

My lords and gentlemen, The important successes which, under the favour of Divine Providence, the valour of my fleet in the West-Indies bath obtained, promise a favourable issue to our operations in that quarter. The events of war in the East-Indies have also been prosperous. Nothing how-ever can be more repugnant to my feelings than the long continuance of to complicated a war.

My ardent desire of peace has induced me to take every measure which promised the speediest accomplishment of my withes; and I wal continue to exert my best endeavours for that purpose. Bu, if for want of a corresponding disposition in our enemies, I should be disappointed in the hope I entertain of a speedy termination of the calamities of war, I rely on the spirit, affection, and unanimity of my parliament and people, to support the honour of my crown, and the interests kingdom; not doubting that the bleffing of Heaven, which I devoutly implore upon our arms, ployed as they are in our just and necessary defence, will enable me to obtain fair and reasonable terms of pacification. The most triumphant career of victory would not excite me to aim at more; and I have the satisfaction to be able to add, that I see no reason which fould induce me to think of accepting less.
