A PROCLAMATION.

A PROCLAMATEON.

WHEREAS by the ninth of the articles of confederation, it is among other things declared, that "the United States in Congrets affembled have the fole and exclusive right and power of regulating the trade, and managing all affairs with the Indians not members of any of the states; provided, that the legisla ive right of any state within its own limits be not infiinged or violated. And whereas, it is essential to the welfare and interest of the United States, as well as necessary for the maintenance of harmony and friendship with the Indimaintenance of harmony and friendship with the Indians, not members of any of the states, that all cause of quarrel and complaint between them and the United States, or any of them, should be removed and prevented; therefore the United States in Congress assembled, have thought proper to iffue their proclamation, and they do hereby prohibit and forbid all perions from making tettlements on lands inhabited or claimed by Indians without the limits or jurisdiction of any parti-cular flate, and from purchasing or receiving any gift or ceifion of fuch lands or claims without the express authority and directions of the United States in Congress

And it is moreover declared, that every such purchase or tettlement, g ft or cession, not having the authority aforesaid, is null and void, and that no right or title will accrue in consequence of any such purchase, gift, cession or lettlement.

Done in Congress at Princeton, this twenty-second day of September, in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and eighty-three, and of

our fovereignty and independence the eighth.
