tenance of public tranquillity, make it his duty to come to an explanation with his Imperial Majefty, on the dif-fere ce between that monarch and the United Provinces.

i he king has the les hefitation in expressing his thoughts on this important subject, as the purity of his intentions cannot be called in question. His majesty, while in compniance with the folicitation of both parties, he employs his good offices to effect a reconciliation between the emperor and the United Provinces, has carefully abitained from giving any opinion on the foundation of his Imperial Majesty's first pretensions. The king still prescribes to himself the same sience; but his con ern for the glory of the emperor authorites the observation, that his first pretensions, and the deman! for the opening of the Scheid, cannot be confidered in the same point of view.

" The Dutch, while they refused compliance with this demand, only supported a right which is secured to them by a folemn treaty, and which they look upon as the bails of their protperity, and even existence.

" It feems to refult from thence, that the refusal of the States General ought to have no other effect than to bring back the negotiations begun at Bruffels, to the propositions in the lummary table, and establish a discussion, on the result of which the respective titles ought naturally to depend.

The king would more earnestly desire that this measure was adopted, as it would prevent hostilities,

and might leid to equitable arrangements.

"By purfuing an opposite conduct it is to be seared that the emperor will excite a general uneafinets, and that most of the powers will think themselves obliged to take fuch precautions and measures as the events may The king himself must be under the necessity require. The king himself must be under the necessity or assembling troops on his frontiers. Besides, his majesty cannot by any means be indifferent to the fate of United Provinces, or fee them attacked by open force in their rights or possessions, especially at present, when he is on the point of concluding with the republic an alliance, the fundamental articles of which were agreed on before the late differences.

" If, by confiderations of fo great importance, the emperor can be induced to supend all marks of hostili-ty, and litten to the voice of moderation and humanity, the king renews the offer of his mediation to procure an equitable and juitable accommodation, which he will the more zeasously strive to bring about, as, while he obeys the dictates of his personal sentiments with regard to the emperor, he will have the fatisfaction to concur in extinguifting, in its first feeds, a war, the confequences of which cannot be foreseen."
