Our fituation now became truly deplorable, without hoats, with but half our hands, wrecked of all our mails, deprived of our compafies, the flip labouring, and often overwhelmed with the most tremendous leas, and expecting every infant to be defied on the floats of Hatteras. Language wants expression to paint the horrors of the diffressed crew and passengers. After every effort to right the thip, we refigired her to the feas, to the mercy of the wind and weather, having loft all our masts and most of our flamen. The next day's sun, raised our drooping spirits to make some feeble effort towards righting ship and making a jury mast, thill drifting ungovernably as the elements would have the proving of the third day, we discovered man, and dratting ungovernatory as the elements would have us. The morning of the third day, we discovered a vessel bearing is by W. about ten miles distant, which perceiving our distress bore down and spoke us, hasted out her boat and gave us relief. She proved to be the Crown, captain Henry Fox, from Norto k to Falmouth. Too much cann t be said or this good man's humanity, who without expetions, relieved out of deadles in administration. who without exaction, relieved our diffeeffes, in administering comfort to the exhausted spatts of the passengers, and giving relief to the wounds and bruifes of the worthy feamen.

The above, I hope, will strike the attention of my

tountrymen, towards erecting a light-house at Cape Henry as well to preserve the lives and property of thousands as to give encouragement to soreigners.
