These fasts confirm a remark which Dr. Percival made in a former volume, that coffee is taken in large quanti-ties, with peculiar propriety, by the Turks and Arabians, because it counteracts the narcotic effects of opium, to the use of which these nations are much addifted.

The deftor then informs us that having learned, by a letter from Sir John Price that an ounce of the best Mocco coffee, newly burnt, made immediately after grinding it, and taken in one dish, with out milk or fugar, is the bell abater of the paroxisms of the periodic asthma; and that Sir John Floyer, during the latter part of his life, after the publication of his book on the asthma, had contrived to preserve himself him, or at least live easy under, that disorder, by the use of strong coffee; he had frequently directed coffee in the asthma with great success. The dish may be repeated after the interval of a quarter or half an hour.
