ANNAPOLIS, January 18.

By captain Moore who arrived at Boston from London, the following intelligence has been refrom the plat ters in the feveral islands in the West-Irdies, commissioners are fent out to receive particular information respecting those complaints, and to make report to parliament as soon as possible. As it appears that the distresses of the several islands are daily increasing, owing to the prohibition of American supplies, the following regulation is expected will be laid before parliament, and is generally the property by the raly thought will be adopted by them, viz.

" To permit and allow inhabitants of the United States of America to export from any part of the United States, into any of his majefty's West India illede, all, or any of the enumerated articles in the proclamation, being the produce of the faid Uried States; as all failed fith, in any floop or tencorer, notwithitanding the same frould be American built, and owned by the inhabitants of the United States; provided elways, that fuch floop or fronter should not exceed in burthen 160 tuns, ard fault not be navigated by more than one mafter ercommander, one mare, five failers, and one boy; and also that rum, sugar, molasses, coffee, &c. taken in payment for fuch articles, may be permitted and allowed to be exported from any of his majefty's illands, on board any American built floop, schooner, ac. of the above dimensions, and navigated as before particularized, to any place or port of the United States, upon payment of the same duties on exportation, and subject to like rules, regulations, securities and restrictions, as the same articles by law are or may be sui ject or lable to, it exported to any British colony or plantation in America." بصافر سيقيعه فالمقادمين بالمعافض والماران المهادمة المستعافي والمتمارين والمتمارية والمتاريخ
