Feb. 15. On Christmas eve, and the next day, the inhabitants of Rimini, in Italy, felt a most terrible fock of an earthquake. Several nouses, the customhouse, and the Cordeliers church, were thrown down. Augustus's triumphal arch bu ft in the middle, and Trajan's bridge was very much damaged. Forty persons perished by the above accident. The confernation was fo great, that upwards of 2000 in-habitants left the town, and fought for shelter in the open plain, and on the borders of the sea.

" The evering-of-the-3d inflant one Levi Bullock of this town, about twenty years of age, who has ferved under captain Shays, was one of those who rook shelter in New-York state and affisted in plundering Stockbridge the 27th ult. and finally ararrived home without wound or imprisonment; yet his fears were such that he durft not be seen publicly: he went to the house of Mr. Mayo, who was from home, and perfuaded his fon, Thomas Mayor about the fame ago to fleep with him: they concluded to fecret themselves in a place made in the fide of a hill to fecure them from the frost, the dimentions of the place is about 10 by 8 feet; its entrance nearly 3 by 2 feet, they entered the fame with a small pot of live coals and a bed, and previoully engaged a youth (brother to Mayo) to fecure the entrance with a board and some snow. The florm of snow which happened that night made the place fill more secure. The morning of the 4th inft. the same youth dug away the snow, opened the place and found them living on their bed to appearance alleep, though breathless :- attempts were made to recover them, but in vain :- a jury of inquest was fummoned by the coroner, whose verdist was, that the said Levi Bullock and Thomas Mayo, came to their death by the mischance of suffocation."

The crews of all the ships from America have been fick, but have happily recovered, except one man who died, on board the Canton. Captain Truxton was nearly ready and intended to fail on the 15th of December. His thip was in complete order and his crew in good health and spirits; fo that his arrival in this port may be shortly expected, as well as that of captain Green, in the Empress of China, who was to have failed about the same period. All the American vettels have met a very favourable reception from the Uninefe, and it is hoped their voyages will prove prosperous and fuccefsful.
