shall improve and yet be the envy and admiration of our misguided neighbours on the continent. If we are labouring under some disadvantages, we have this confolation, that we can eat our loaves and fishes in peace, lies from the noise and bustle of mobs and riots.

"The greatest source of wealth we can at present promise ou selves will arise from the establishment of a whate fishery on this coast; fifteen sale of vessels are already at lea, belonging to this port, and if we may judge from the encouragement the owners have already met with in the sale of their oil in the London market, we may expect as many more fitted out for Brazil in the course of the summer.

Lord Dorchester is expected here in the course of the entuing month, when it is expected several new arrangements will take place-the affembly is prorogued 'till his arrival :-- We greatly fear his lordship will order the majority of our garrison to Quebec and New-Brunswick, which will deprive us of a good deal of circulating cash: however, if there is occasion for them, in order to strengthen the frontiers, we must bear the loss with fortitude: We should sacrifice our private interest to the general good.

" Several of our loyal friends are drawing for their claims; this will enable them to settle and cultivate their farms in an ample manner."

Extract of a letter of a late date from a gentleman in one of the back counties of Virginia, to his friend in Philadelphia.

" I have recent advices from the territory of Kentucke, Holstein, Noilychucky, French Broad, the Cherokee nation, and as far south as the Ocounas, and am well assured that there is more peace, good order and contentment in the Cherokee towns, than there is among their white neighbours, who are obliged to employ a fet of men they call r guiators to crush the idle vagabonds and house thieves that come among them. This plainly demonstrates the necessity of the present convention. May the Governor of the univerte inspire them with wisdom and unanimity."
