STATE OF GEORGIA IN CONVENTION.

Wednesday, January 2, 1788. WE the delegates of the people of the state of Georgia, in convention met, having taken into our ferious confideration the federal constitution, agreed upon and proposed by the deputies of the United States in general convention, held in the city of Philadelphia, on the 17th day September, in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and eighty-seven, have affented to, satisfied and adopted, and by these presents do, in virtue of the powers and authority to us given by the people of the foid flate for that purpose, for and in behalf of ourselves and constituents, fully and entirely assent to, ratify and adopt, the said constitution, which is hereunto annexed under the great seal of the said state.

DONE in convention, at Augusta, in the faid state, on the second day of January, in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and eighty-eight, and of the independence of the

United States the twelfth.
