44 Mr. Nicholas was up feveral times upon this sobject, and had been the first mover of it; but at last relinquished it as not tenable."

By a gentleman arrived in town from Greenbriar county, we learn, that captain Clindenen, about the first of April, soon after taking his station upon the Geat Kanawa, sent out spies, who discovered Indians in that quarter stealing horses; he sent part of his garrison in pursuit of them, who took one scalp. Since which, his spies making a second discovery, he took a canoe, and with seven men went in the night to the mouth of Coal river, lauded on the lower side, went up the river and discovered three horses, which the Indians had stolen, soon after they discovered three Indians, two of which were making a raft while the other directed. After completing the raft they put their guns and plander upon it, when the Indian who directed got upon it, and the others swam after. When they got near the other shore, captain Clindenen's party fired opon them, killed the director and one that was iwimming, the other made his escape, but was supposed to be mortally wounded .- Since which the Indians have cut off a family on Greenbriar river, little below the mouth of Muddy creek, of the name set Griffith confitting of five persons.
