RATIFICATION of the new conflitution, by the convention of Virginia, on Wednesday last, by a ma-

jority of ten. WE, the delegates of the people of Virginia, duly elected, in pursuance of a recommendation of the general affembly and now met in convention. having fully and fairly investigated and discussed the proceedings of the federal convention, and being prepared, as well as the most mature deliberation will enable us, to decide thereon, DO, in the name and behalf of the people of Virginia, declare and make known, that the powers granted under the constitution being derived from the people of the United States, may be resumed by them when soever the same shall be perverted to their injury or oppression, and that every power not granted thereby remains with them and at their will: That therefore no right, of any denomination, can be cancelled, abridged, restrained or modified, by the congress, by the senate or house of representatives, acting in any capacity, by the president, or any department or officer of the United States, except in those instances where power is given by the constitution for those purposes: That among other essential rights, the liberty of conscience and of the press, cannot be cancelled, abridged, restrained or modified, by any authority of the United States;

" With these impressions, with a solemn appeal to the fearcher of hearts for the purity of our intentions, and under the conviction, that whatforver imperfections may exist in the constitution, oughtrather to be examined in the mode prescribed therein, than to bring the union into danger by delay, with a hope of obtaining amendments previous to

the ratification. " We the faid delegates, in the name and in behalf of the people of Virginia, do by these presents affent to and ratify the constitution, recommended on the 17th day of September, 1787, by the federal convention for the government of the United States; hereby announcing to all those whom it may concern, that the faid constitution is binding upon the faid people, according to an authentic appy hereto annexed, in the words following:"-

[Here foliowed a copy of the constitution.] A letter from Richmond advises, that a motion for previous amendments was rejected by a majority. of eight; but that some days would be passed in con-Adering subsequent amendments, and these, it appeared, from the temper of the covention, would be recommended.
