The ship Mary, captain Bodsield, is arrived from London, and has brought papers only to the 26th of August, from which the following is extracted.

L O N D O N, August 26.

Europe is now so involved in war, that it is not easy to determine on which side to direct the attention. Between Russia, the Emperor and the Porte, upwards of nine bundred thousand men are in the field, ready for all the horrors, devastation and mischief, of an eagerly contested war. Sweden has taken hold of the opportunity to attack Russia both by land and sea, and in both has been opposed-Denmark and Prussia seem to look on, as ready to join this convulsed tumult of nations.—The voice of peace and mediation is no more heard, and alliances are forming to promote, not prevent, the destruction of thousands, or stem the current of human blood.

The advantages of the several contests have hitherto been pretty nearly divided between the contending powers. The empress has been successful against the Turks by sea, but on land her progress is retarded by a numerous, brave, and resolute force, capable, if not of attack, or open fight, at least of defence. The captain pacha's necessary retreat, however, from the mouth of the Dnieper, leaves the important fortress of Oczakow at the mercy of the Russian army, and it is probable they will foon be able to reduce it.

The fituation of France is yet becoming more critical; but in a different manner from what was expected. The riots and tumults, always much exaggerated by report, have subsided, and the states general are to be called—a step that promises perhaps as much in favour of the court as of the people. It is the great af- tion for either. THOMAS RUTLAND. sembly of the nation, and its sentiments, at least, are decisive; but there is no reason to think that the innovating spirit which has shewn itself in some places will prevail here.

From Hamburgh, August 15, we are informed, That, with yesterday's mail from Prussia, a letter, dated the 7th instant, was received from Memel, which mentions news being arrived from Mittau and Libau, that the Swedes had obtained a great victory over the Russians in Finland. However, the letters from Petersburgh, of the 29th of July, and a courier that left that place the first of this month, and passed through this city the day before yesterday, say nothing of this event. In the mean time, there are some letters from Stockholm, of the 5th instant, that speak of an advantage which general Hastfehr had obtained against a confiderable body of Russian troops, which may have given birth to the report of the above great victory. Among the prisoners taken, was a wounded general, with the order of Alexander Newskey. The mail due from Sweden, which may yet come in tonight, will, no doubt, bring further particulars. The report of a new sea battle between the Russian and Swedish fleets, is equally uncertain; only it is known, that the Russians, with 16 ships of the line, and the Swedes, with 18, are out again at fea.
