April 22 On Saturlay night last departed this life, in the 85th year of his age, Dr. BENJAMIN FRANKLIN, of this city. His remains were interred yeiterday, afternoon, at four o'clock, in Christ-Church burial ground.

We are favoured with the following short account of Dr. FRANKLIN's last illness, by his attending physician.

'THE stone, with which he had been afflicted for several years, had for the last twelve months confined him chiefly to his bed; and during the extreme painful paroxyims, he was obliged to take large doses of laudanum to mitigate his tortures—still, in the intervals of pain, he not only amused himself with reading and conversing cheerfully with his family and a few friends, who visited him, but was often employed in doing business of a public as well as private nature, with various persons, who waited on him for that purpole; and in every instance displayed; not only that readiness and disposition of doing good, which was the distinguishing characteristic of his life, but the fullest and clearest possession of his uncommon mental abilities; and not unfrequently indulged himself in those Jeux D'esprit and entertaining anecdotes, which were be no application before the first of May, it will ! the delight of all who heard him.
