EXAMPLE OF CHINESE BENEFICENCE. IN the year 1740, the ship Prince George took her departure from Calcutta, in Bengal, for Canton, in China, with a cargo of 60,000l. value. A violent itorm drove her ashore at a place named Timpau, a great way from Canton. Not above half the crew could make the shore, worn out with fatigue and hunger, and not doubting of being massacred by the natives. How amazed were they to be treated with remarkable humanity! --- A mandarin appeared, who not only provided for them victuals in plenty, but also men skilled in diving to affift them in filling the wreck. What tolows is in the words of Alexander Wedderburn, of St. Germains, a gentleman of known worth and veracity, who bore office in the ship-" In a few days we recovered 5000l. in bullion, and afterwards 10,000l. more. Before we set forward to Canton, the mandarin, our heefactor, took an exact account of our money, with he names of the men, furnished us with an elcort to onduct us through his district, and configned us, dead alive, to one suqua, at Canton, a Chinese merchant Ring-places victuals were brought to us by the vilgers in plenty, and with great cordiality. In this inner we passed from one dutrict to another, wi hout aving occasion to lay out a tingle farthin, till we ached Canton, which we did in nine days, trace ling metimes by land, and sometimes by water. The first supercargo reived 450 tales in filver, the second 350, myself 250, mate 75, and each common feaman 15, the whole nounting to about 2000 tales, or 8001.
