"I beg you to make my letter public, as well as the etter herein enclosed.

" I expect to fail from thence, from the 15th to the 5th of July, destined for Boston.

" Farewel, dear Sir, I reiterate to you my affurances the fincere friendship and esteem which I have wowed to you for life. PONTEVES-GIEN." (Signed)
