The king having re-fitted his fleet with the utmost dispatch, after his retreat to Schwenksund, sailed again in quest of the prince of Nassau's fleet, which he ame up with on the 9th of July, in the morning. The action commenced about half past nine in the

norning, and continued without intermission till 12 clock at night, maintained with much obstinacy and irmness on both sides. The fleets for some time could only take aim at each other, by directing their fire to that quarter where they saw the flash occasioned by the discharge of the other's guns. But they now ceased, as if by mutual consent, on both fides.

The men were ordered immediately to get some refreshments, and to lose no time in making such repairs as were practicable in a short space of time, as the king was determined not to allow the fleets to fee parate with any appearance of its having been a drawn battle.

Accordingly the attack was again renewed about two o'clock in the morning with as much vigour as ever, and continued till nine. The conduct and courage of the king, who commanded in person, and the able support he received from lieutenant-colonel Cronstadt, at last determined the victory in our favour; and the Russians were entirely descated.

We loft on our part, two gun boats, blown up, and one, Udemia, a large vessel, which was sunk by a bomb, the crew were faved.

We consider it as a good omen here, that the day on which we gained this important victory over the Russians, was the 28th anniversary of the empress of Russia's accession to the throne.

The following is an official account of the Russian frigates and gallies taken or deliroyed on the 9th and 10th of July.
