That for all stores, provisions, &c. supplied from the company's warehouses, the company shall receive an equitable compensation, according to fixed rules, extending to the blacks and whites indiscriminately.

That the civil, military, personal, and commercial rights and duties of blacks and whites, shall be the same, and secured in the same manner.

And for the full affurance of personal protection from flavery to all fuch black fettlers, the company have subjoined a copy of a clause contained in the act of parliament, whereby they are incorporated, viz.

Provided also, and be it further enacted, that it shall not be lawful for the said company, either directly or indirectly, by itself or themselves, or by the agents or servants of the said company, or otherwise howsoever, to deal or traffic in the buying or selling of saves, or in any manner whatsoever to have, hold, appropriate, or employ any person or persons in a state of flavery, in the service of the said company."
