NEW-YORK, Nevember 24.

The scarlet and putrid fevers rage with great violence in this city; they are very contagious, as 1 always the case with fach fevers, and generally prove fatal to those who are attacked; not being confined to any particular description of people, but both old and young equally feel their malignant effects.

AUGUSTA, (Georgia) November 17. On Monday last, the circuit court of the United States for this district, was opened by the honourable Thomas Johnson, one of the affociate justices of the supreme court of the United States, and the honourable Nathaniel Pendleton, district judge of this dif-

Four persons, who sailed from Boston to the illand of Martinique, and from thence to Savanna, in May last, were indicted and tried for stealing on the high seas, near the island of Martinique, a number of negroes, belonging to the inhabitants of that island; Samuel Skinner, of Boston, who was supercargo of the vessel, and who appeared to be the principal, was found guilty by the jury, on his own confession, upon the 16th section of the law for the punishment of certain crimes, against the United States, and was sentenced to receive thirty-nine lashes, to pay a fine of one hundred dollars, all lawful charges of the profecution, and to stand committed till the sentence was complied with. The other three prisoners, to wit: Nathaniel Hickman, Robert Watts, and Nathaniel Ridgeway, were acquitted. The court fat four days, during which time several civil causes were tried, and a general satisfaction seemed to prevail. We hear that judge Blair, was to have rode the fouthern circuit, but the indisposition of his family prevented it.

Samuel Skinner, pursuant to the above-mentioned sentence, was, on Wednesday last, publicly whipped at the market-house in this town.

KNOXVILLE, November 3.

Since our last, a troop of horse, commanded by captain James Richardson, and several companies of foot, composing the brigade under the command of general Sevier, have arrived in town. The general is now in camp, and, we are happy to add, is in a better itate of health than he has been for some months

The orderly and regular behaviour of these troops, fince their arrival in this town, has gained them the highest honour; and we have every reason to hope that from the activity, bravery, and good conduct of this army, our bleeding country will be well supported and defended, and perhaps entirely relieved from the bloody, barbarous, and unrelenting hands of merciles

Late accounts from the Cherokees say, that that nation, aided by the Creeks, have politively determined to erect three stockade forts, with block-houses; one at the confluence of the Tenessee and Clinch rivers, the fecond at Running Water town on the Tenessee, and the third at the Creek crossing place, near the Muscle shoals, by which means they expect to be able and convenient to continue, occasionally, their hostile depredations on any part of our fouthwestern territory.

"The French affairs grow daily more ferious; the Prussian army has advanced beyond Chalons, which was the principal rendezvous of the French, who retreated in great disorder .- The duke of Brunswick approaches Paris, by flow and cautious marches, and it is imagined he will reach it about the 1st of October; riots and the most abominable measures continue in that devoted city. As the Prushans approach, it is expected the mob will become more outrageous, that the murder of the king and queen cannot be prevented, and that the city will probably be plundered and destroyed. The new national convention has affembled and declared itself constituent and supreme, they however submit to the mob in every thing, and lanction their vile proceedings. The armies have had leveral actions. in which the undisciplined French have been generally worsted. As the friend of liberty, I weep over the fate of that unhappy people."
