Extract from a Cape-François paper (the General Monitor) of the 14th December, 1792.

" In consequence of the advice received concerning the delay still attending the acceptation of the draughts, drawn by the administration of this colony upon Mr. La Foreit, consul general of France at Philadelphia. Mr. Sothonax, national civil-commissioner, has made the following requisition to M. Ternan, minister of France to the United States, and has added the most pressing initances to induce him to take effectual measures to prevent a further delay of the acceptation and payment of thele draughts. The director general of St. Domingo has written at the lame time to Mr. La Forett, to let him know the real situation of the colony, and to do away any doubts that might be entertained upon the legality of the draughts. Consequently it may be presumed, that in future the payment of the draughts already drawn, or those that may be drawn hereaster to complete the four millions of French livres, granted by the national affembly the 26th of June last, upon the debt due from the United States to the French nation, will meet with no kind of oottacle.

Extract from LINDSAY'S HOTEL DIARY, January 9.

On Sunday last arrived here the brig William Pennock, captain Williams, who left Guadaloupe the 15th December. Four days before captain Williams sailed, the frigate Felicite arrived, in thirty-five days from France, at Dominica, and brought news of the is fold. defeat of the combined forces.
