For Establishing a Circulating Library In the City

ANNAPOLIS.

THE utility of so extensive a library, as this is proposed to be, for profit and pleasure, as well for the citizens as the students at this grand seminary of learning, needs no comment.

It is proposed that books shall be purchased, to compose the library, in Europe, to the amount of 1000 guineas, that they shall consist of the latest editions of law, physic, divinity, history, science, essays, and works of eminent writers, purchased to the best advantage, and the librarian shall covenant to add to the library books to the amount of ten guineas cost annually, at his own expence, such as the trustees shall think proper to direct.

There shall be 100 subscribers at ten guineas each, payable on the artival of the books, and establishment of the library, and each of the subscribers shall be entitled, for the said subscription, to read the books of the library for ten successive years.
