Extract of a letter from a gentleman in Philadelphia, to bis friend in New-York, dated March 17.

" We are told here, that an ambassador extraordipary is immediately expected from England, his bufiness is not known, but it is conjectured he will bring proposals for establishing a commercial treaty, which if agreed to, all restrictions will be taken off American vessels; if this be so, Mr. Madison's propositions will fail; but if not, I believe they will be able imported; the British spoliation of our property is certainly a very great grievance, and is now severely selt throughout the United States.

" Mr.—, just arrived here from England, with an intention of tettling in this country, fays, that the kingdom was never to ripe for a revolt as at this time; and it is only the power (excercised by stratagem) of the dependents on government that prevents it, but he thinks even this must soon fall. In spite of all the exertions of government, inflammatory pamphlets, &c. are daily distributed among the people in every part of the kingdom; the eyes and understanding of the meanest pealant) are now open to the schemes and oppression of the present rulers, and they are determined the system shall be changed; the king is afraid to go any where without a double guard, and never takes an airing or hunting in the private manner he formerly did; Mr. Pitt has a private guard fitting up ia his house every night; success to the French revolutionists, is publicly drank in the porter houses, and Ca Ira fung by the commonalty through the freets. The Scotch are determined to be free, and are now doubly irritated from the treatment given to some members of their convention; if the Scotch blood boils over, it will cause a flame perhaps not soon extinguished.
