Serious intimations are given me that I am confidered by you, as greatly criminal in the late insurrection in this country, and that though I may have shielded myself from the law by taking advantage of the terms of the amnesty proposed by the commissioners, and sanctioned by the proclamation of the president, yet that I shall not escape the resentment of individuals. It would seem to me totally improbable that republican foldiers would fully the glory of their voluntary rifing by a single intemperate act. Nevertheless, as it would wound me with exquisitive sensibility, to be treated with indignity, by words, or looks, short of violence, I beg leave to suggest to you, that it is a maxim of reason, that a man " shall be presumed innocent until the contrary is proved;" and I give you a strong prefumption of my innocence, viz. that though having the opportunity of relinquishing the country, I stand firm, and will surrender myself to the closest examination of the judges, and put myself entirely on the merit or demerit of my conduct, through the whole of the unfortunate crisis.
