ing the fum of fifty pounds current money. XVIII. SOUTHAMPTON, November 1.

HE weather has been fo unusually severe for . some days pall that the farther embarkation of the troops and thores, destined for the West-Indies, has been almost entirely suspended; this delay must, of course, be attended with serious consequences, should the wind come round to the eastward, as the sailing of the transports cannot possibly take place for some time at any rate, were the weather immediately to prove ever so fine, of which, however, God knows! there is no very encouraging prospect, as it blows as hard a gale as ever. The inconvenience which this expedition has thus

sustained might have been prevented, had proper veffels been engaged for the fervice; but while all the men and stores had no other means of being conveyed on board but in small open boats, it was evident, that should foul weather occur, no officer, who knew his duty, could permit them to run the risk of being swamped along fide of the West-Indiamen, and other large ships.
