The E have had nothing but anxiety and trouble file ieveral days past—General Nanendorf's troop's approached our city on the 24th, and obliged the French flationed here to cover their main army, to re-On the 25th and 26th, on account of the desperate reliftance which the French made from the walls of this city with howitzers, grenades, &c. we were thrown into the utmost afarm. CARLSRUHE, September 20.

On the 18th inflant, at four in the morning, the Authrians attacked the French intrenchments near Kehl, and two buttalions of the archduke Ferdinand charged the enemy, with the bayonet—about feven o'clock they were mallers of the intronchaents and the fort; they had made 800 of the French priloners, and killed or wounded 1200; the French general Scherb was among the flain. All the baggager cannon and ammonition of the French, fell into the hands of the Authrans; but the latter having reglected to defitoy the bridge near the Rhine, and a part of the foldiers being employed in dividing the booty, the French, about moon, having received a reinforcement of 3000 men, and being covered by a numerous artillery from the lett bank of the Rhine, recook the fort, the poffession of which is so important in a campaign in Su-
