" This country is in the most distressed figuation you can imagine, business at an entire fland, and party work runs to high, that those who were formerly the greatest intimates, will scarcely look each other in the sace.

" The two parties are United Irisomen and l'eomen; I am a member of the latter. You will be surprised when I tell you that I belong to a troop of horse, commanded by Mr. ----, I have been regularly taught to ride (which is unnecessary for an Irishman) and am now getting instructions in the Hanoverian sword exercise. We are daily in expections of our abilities being put to the tell, as the French are expected to make another attempt to invade this country. We are lest entirely to our own thists, as the emperor has made peace.

" We would have little to fear in case of actual invalion, were it not that a great part of the army are disaffected. Should disturbances begin, which is next to a certainty, the flaughter and havock will be dreadful; I expect little else than to be opposed to some of my own relations, which God sorbid."

Extrall of another letter from Newry.
