upon which the decision was founded, be transmitted to the secretary of the treasury, who is emmitted to the lecretary of the treatury, who is empowered to over-rule the faid decision, and direct the relitation, in whole or in part, of the duties collected in consequence of it; and it the person conceives himself aggrieved by the determination of the secretary of the treatury, he may within four months inflitute a fuit in the diffried court, against the supervisor, in the maintaining of which he is, however, confined to the affigument and proof of fuch facts as thall have been fet forth in his original statement.

LICENCE DUTIES.

The persons subject to duty as retailers under the laws of the United States, are those who deal in the felling of wines to be carried or fent cut of their houses, buildings, &c. in a smaller quantity at any one time than thirty galiens, except in the original cask or package in which it was imported, and those who, in like manner, sell foreign spirits in a smaller quantity than 20 gallons. The duties payable by the perform are five dollars yearly, for a licence for the lale of wines, and the like fum for a diftinct and separate licence to fell spiritucus liquors; and every person who retails wine or sweign spirits without such licence, unexpired and in force, incurs in each and either cale a penalty of fifty dollars. A licence au-thorites the sale of liquors but at one place.

The month of September was also originally essigned for the receipt of those duties, and is, of course, the proper period for those whose licences expire in that menth to procure new ones; but as this tax is, difterently from that on carriages, always paid entire, and fiv a whole year, persons who commence the bufinels of retailing at any time whatever must obtain

licence before they begin to fell.

It remains to observe that these laws having been long fince duly promulgated, and extraordinary fleps taken repeatedly to excite attention to them, all penalties incured under them will positively by exacted.
