An ACT to appoint an agent for the year one thousand feven hundred and ninely-eight.

DE it enalted, by the General Assembly of Maryland,
That William Marbury be agent of this state, to
execute the trust and power reposed in him by virtue of
this act, from the first day of January, one thousand
feven hundred and ninety-eight, until the first day of
January, one thousand seven hundred and ninety-sine.

II. And be it enalted, That the said agent superintend
the collection of all arrearages and balances due from
the several collectors of the respective counties within
this state, appointed since the first day of January, seventeen hundred and eighty-three; and the said agentis hereby authorised and required to call upon the trea-

is hereby authorifed and required to call upon the trea-furers of the respective shores for an accurate statement of all arrearages and balances due from such collectors, and fuch accounts shall be furnished by the faid trea. turers accordingly.

fuers accordingly.

III. And be it enalled, That the faid agent be authorised to superintend the collection of balances due to the state on the auditor's hooks; or on open account; and the said agent shall have power to require payment of, and, if necessary, to sue for and recover the same; and the said agent, with the approbation of the governor and council, may make composition with any such debtors, and take bonds to the state, with sufficient security, and give time for payment, not exceeding two years from the siris day of January, seventeen hundred and ninety-eight.

IV. And be it exacted, That the faid agent be authorised to superintend the collection of all momes due to the flate for naval duties, fines, penalties, forfeitures and amerciaments, and forfeited recognizinces, and for ordinary, retailers and marriage licences, and to require payment, and, it necessary, sue for and recover the same; and the said agent may allow for insolvencies, and credit any modey that the party is not chargeable with hy law, and for his information of the law, he may take the advice of the attorney-general in

writing.
V. And be it enedled, That whenever there shall be ocasion to expole to public sale the property of any collector, or his fecurities, by virtue of any execution already issued, or to be issued for this purpose, the said agent shall cause at least thirty days public notice to be given of such sale, and shall attend the same, and if it shall appear that there is danger of fosing any part of the dath due to the state, shall purpose the same of the same the dabt due to the flate, and not other so, shall purchase any property so exposed to fate for the use of the state, in payment, or part payment, as the cale may be, of the arreatages due by the collectora whose property may be so purchased, and that no purchase unsoring by this act shall be considered as made on the part of the state, unsers a public sleedaration to this effect be made by the agent, or his deputy, immediately after such sale and purchase; and any property so purchased for the use of the state, the said agent may spain expose to public auction on the most advantageous terms for the use of the state, and if the same be sold on credit, which shall in no case exceed the term of two years, the said agent shall take bond, with good and sofficient security, to be approved of by the treasurer of the weltern shore, from the purchasers of such property, and ern shore, from the purchasers of such property, and all bonds by him so taken shall be deposited, with an accurate list thereof subscribed by him, in the treasury of the preserving and shall be a firm upon the real property of such purchasers, and their securities, from

the respective dates, or in much thereof as is mentioned in the schedule thereto spagesell.

VI. And be it enacled. That the fair agent is hereby directed to dispose of all conficeted British property that emains unfold, and take bottes to the state, with fulficient security, and give time for the payment there-of, not exceeding two years from the first day of Janu-ary, one thousand fever handcest and whety eight, and that where the questity of land in any one body tub-jest to tych fals, exceeds, the quantity of fifty acres, inch land thall be disposed of at public fals, or the time and place of which fale at jeast thirty days previous no-nice that be given by public advertisement; and that at the time of any tale by virtue of this act; the laid agent fill make known that he only fells, the right of this date thereto, and that the flare doth not guaranty the title to the fame; or any part thereof, but that the pur-chase much be in all respects at the fill of the pur-

the state, the same may be sold by the agent, and he is
hereby authorised and empowered to sell the same at
public sale, giving thirty days notice, on a credit of two years, payable one half of the principal,
and the whole interest, annually, on the first day of
December in each year, and the bonds, when taken,
shall be returned to the treasury of the western slore,
and reported to the general assembly at their session
next ensuing the taking of such bonds,

XI. And be it enasted, That all cases in chancery,

XII. And be it enalted, That it any bond debtor to the state for consistent property purchased, or otherwise, shall neglect to make payment, agreeably to the condition of his bond, and sundry resolves of the general assembly, the taid agent shall cause process to issue for the whole principal and interest then due, or

fue for the whole principal and interest then due, or shall proceed on any execution already issued, and served and infended, as occasion may require, or, under the direction and with the approbation of the governor and council, he is hereby authorised to delay any execution as long as they may think expedient and necessary.

XIII. And be it enalled, That the faid agent be authorised to superintend the collection of all balances due on bond taken for taxes due before the first day of

anuary, seventeen hundred and eighty-three; and the faid agent thall also superiotend the collection of all balances due on bonds initalled, or otherwise, for the

XXI. And be it enacted.
