As ACT to appoint an agent for the year one thousand fewen hundred and ninety-eight.

BE it enalled, by the General Ajembly of Maryland,
That William Mirbury be agent of this state, to
execute the trust and power reposed in him by virtue of
this act, from the first day of January, one thousand
feren hundred and innery-eight, until the first day of
January, one thousand seven hundred and minety-nine.

It. And be it enalled, That the said agent superintend
the collection of all arrearages and bulances due from

II. deal to in enaded, That the faid agent superintend the collection of all arrearages and balances due from the several collectors of the respective counties within this state, appointed since the first day of January, sewereen hundred and eighty-three; and the said agent is hereby authorised and required to call upon the treaturess of the respective shores for an accurate statement of all arrearages and balances due from such collectors, and such accounts shall be surnished by the said treatures accordingly.

III. And be it eralled, That the faid agent be authorifed to superintend the collection of balances due to the date on the auditor's books, or on open account; and the said agent diall have power to require payment of, and, if necessary, to sue for and recover the same f and the said agent, with the approbation of the governor and council, may make compassition with any such delitors, and take bonds to the state, with sufficient security, and give time for payment, not exceeding two years from the first day of January, seventeen hundred and ninety-eight.

IV. And be it enacted. That the faid agent he authorized to superintend the collection of all monies due to the state for naval duties, sinces, penalties, forfeitures and amerciaments, and forfeited recognizances, and for ordinary, tetoilers and marriage licences, and to require payment, and, it necessary, sue for and recover the same; and the said agent may allow for intolvence, and credit any money that the party is not chargeable with by law, and for his information of the law, he may take the advice of the attorney-general in

writing.

V. Indbe it enalled, That whenever there shall be cerasion to expose to public sale the property of any exclusion, or his securities, by virtue of any execution already issued, or to be issued for this purpose, the said agent shall cause at least thirty days public notice to be given at such tale, and shall attend the same, and if it hill appear that there is danger of losing any part of the debt due to the state, and not otherwise, shall purchate any property so exposed to sale for the use of the slate, in payment, or part payment, as the case may be, of the arrearages due by the collectors whose property may be fir purchased, and that no purchase authorized by this act shall be considered as made on the part of the state, unless a public declaration to that effect be suade by the agent, or his deputy, immediately after such sale and purchase; and any property so purchase for the use of the state, the said agent may again exposed to subic action, on the most advantageous terms, for the use of the state, and if, the same to sud on credit, which shall in no case exceed the term of two years, the said agent shall take bond, with good and sufficient security, to be approved us by the treasure of the western shore, from the purchasers of such property, and all bonds by sling to taken shall be deposited, with an accurate lift thereof subtrailed by him, in the treasury of the western shore, and shall be a lien upon the real property by such actes, or so much thereof as is mentioned in the schedule shereto annexed.

VI. And be it enacted, That the faid agent is hereby directed to dispose of all confiscated British property that remains unfold, and take bonds to the state, with sufficient security, and give time for the payment thereof, not exceeding two years from the first day of January, one thousand seven hundred and ninety eight, and that where the quantity of land in any one took subject to such sale exceeds the quantity of first acres, suth land shall be disposed or at public sale, or the time and place of which sale at least thirty slays previous notice shall be given by public advertisement; and that at the time of any sale by virtue of this ast, the said agent the time of any take by virtue of this salt, the said agent shall make known that he only sells the right of this state therefor and that the state doth not guaranty the tips to the same, or any part thereof, but that the purchaser.

And be it enasted, That if, under the terms of any compromise made as associated, the property here-toire purchased should be taken back and revested in the state, the same may be fold by the agent, and he is hereby authorised and empowered to sell the same at public sale, giving thirty days notice, on a credit of two years, payable one half of the principal, and the whole interest, annually, on the first day of December in each year, and the bonds, when taken, shall be returned to the treasury of the western shore, and reported to the general assembly at their session as x ensuing the taking of such bonds.

XI. And be it inactel, That all cases in chancery, where no compromie under this act is effected, shall be piaced under the direction of the agent, who is hereby surhorised and required to call on the attorney-general to scosecute or defend the irms to immediate final decision; and the governor and council are hereby authorised and empowered, at the request of the agent, in cases of difficulty, to aid the attorney-general, by employing any person to attend to surveys where necessary, or otherwise to affilt in the prosecution or defence of said suits, which person or persons are to be paid out of the contingent sund of size hundred pounds; and the names of the persons to employed, together with the sum allowed for their services, to be said before the general assembly at their next session.

LONDON, January 12.

PY the Wallingham packet arrived at Falmouth from Lifbon, the following intelligence has been received:—

"Lord St. Vincent had sent home all the men of war, except the Ville de Paris, and sour frigates, the Emerald, the Lively, Aurora, &c. which were at Liston when the Walfingham sailed. Accounts were received at Liston a sew days previous to the sailing of the Walfingham, that Sir John Orde, who was then eruising off Cadiz with a squadron of line of battle ships, had fallen in with a steer of merchantmen, very richly laden, under the convoy of three Spanish line of battle ships, bound from the Havanna to Cadiz; the result was, that Sir John had captured the shree Spanish line of battle ships, and greatest part; if not the whole of the fleet. The greatest credit was given to the above information at Liston, inalmuch that the arrival of the Spanish men of war and merchantmen were daily expected there when the packet sailed from thence. Admiral Parker had hosted his slag on board his majesty's ship Princess Royal, and had lailed with fix line of battle ships, to cruste off Cadiz, and to supercede Sir John Orde. Both squadrons would form a very strong seet, and admiral Parker was to have the command, to cruste off and on Cadiz bay, and watch the mollous of the Spaniards lying there, but who durst not venture out, though so much superior in numbers to the British sleet. A fleet of merchasic refels had sailed from Liston, that lond St. Videent had convoy of his majesty's ship Irrefullible, of 74 guess, G.
