An ACT to appoint an agent for the year one thousand seven bundred and ninesy-eight.

DE it enacted, by the General Assembly of Maryland,
That Wisliam Marbury be agent of this state, to
execute the trust and power reposed in him by virtue of
this act, from the first day of January, one thousand
teven hundred and ninety-eight, until the first day of
January, one thousand seven hundred and ninety-nine.

It ded is it enacted. That the first agent superiored

11. And he is enadled, That the faid agent superintend the collection of all arrearages and balances due from the feveral collectors of the respective counties within this state, appointed since the first day of January, seventeen hundred and eighty-three; and the faid agent is hereby authorifed and required to call upon the trea-turers of the respective shores for an accurate statement of all arrearages and balances due from such collectors, and such accounts shall be surnished by the said trea-Juvers accordingly.

III. And be it enalled, That the faid agent be authorised to superintend the collection of balances due to the flate on the auditor's books, or on open account; and the faid agent shall have power to require payment of, and, if necessary, to sue for and recover the same; and the said agent, with the approbation of the governor and council, may make composition with any such debtors, and take bonds to the flate, with sufficient se-curity, and give time for payment, not exceeding two years from the first day of January, seventeen hundred

and ninety-eight. IV. and be it enalled, That the faid agent be authorised to superintend the collection of all monies due to the flate for naval duties, fines, penalties, forfeitures and americaments, and forfeited recognizances, and for ordinary, retailers and marriage licences, and to require payment, and, it necessary, sue for and recover the same; and the said agent may allow for insolvencies, and credit any money that the party is not chargeable with my law, and for his information of the law, he may take the advice of the attorney-general in

writing.
V. And be it enadled, That whenever there shall be occasion to expose to public sale the property of any collector, or his securities, by virtue of any execution elready islued, or to be islued for this purpose, the said agent shall cause at least thirty days public notice to be given of such tale, and shall attend the same, and if it shall appear that there is danger of losing any part of the debt due to the stare, and not otherwise, shall purpose the start of chase any property so exposed to sale for the use of the flate, in payment, or part payment, as the case may be, of the arrearages due by the collectors whose property may be so purchased, and that no purchase authorised by this act shall be considered as made on the part of the fiate, unless a public declaration to that effect be made by the agent, or his deputy, immediately after fuch fale and purchases, and any property so purchased for the use of the state, the said agent may again expose for the use of the state, the said agent may again expose to public auction on the most advantageous terms, for the use of the state, and if the same be sold on credit, which shall in no case excred the term of two years, the said agent shall take bond, with good and sufficient security, to be approved of by the treaturer of the western shore, from the purchasers of such property, and all bonds by him so taken shall be deposited, with an accurate list thereof subscribed by him, in the treasury of the western shore, and shall be a lien upon the real property of such purchasers, and their securities, from the respective dates, or so much thereof as is mentioned in the schedule thereto annexed.

VI. And be it enalled, That the said agent is hereby

And be it enalled, That the agent, with the approbation and confent of the governor and council, be and he is hereby authorifed and empowered to compro-mife any fuit depending in chancery with any flate debtor, upon any terms in their judgment calculated to promote the interest of the state, and to obtain the

speedy receipt of the sums due.

X. And be it enalled, That is, under the terms of any compromise made as asocesaid, the property hereany compromite made as aforefaid, the property here-tolore purchated floudd be taken back and reveffed in the state, the same may be fold by the agent, and he is hereby authorised and empowered to sell the same at public sale, giving thirty days notice, on a cre-dit of two years, payable one half of the principal, and the whole interest, annually, on the first day of December in each year, and the bonds, when taken, shall be returned to the treasury of the western shore, and reported to the general assembly at their session next ensuing the taking of such bonds.

XI. And be it enaded, That all cases in chancery where no compromite under this act is effected, shall be placed under the direction of the agent, who is hereby authorised and required to call on the attorney-general to prosecute or defend the same to immediate final decifion; and the governor and council are hereby authoction; and the governor and council are hereby authorifed and empowered, at the request of the agent, in cases of difficulty, to aid the attorney-general, by employing any person to attend to surveys where necessary, or otherwise to assist in the prosecution or defence of said suits, which person or persons are to be paid out the names of the contingent sund of five hundred pounds; and the names of the persons so employed, together with the sum allowed for their services, to be said before the general assembly at their next scsion.

XII. And be it enacted, That it any bond debtor to the flate for conflicted property purchased, or otherwise, shall neglect to make payment agreeably to the condition of his bond, and sundry resolves of the general assembly, the said agent shall cause process to iffue for the whole principal and interest then due, or shall proceed on any execution already issued, and served and suspended, as occasion may require, or, under the direction and with the approbation of the governor and council, he is hereby authorifed to delay any execution

as long as they may think expedient and necessary.

XIII. And be it enaded, That the said agent be authorised to superintend the collection of all balances due on bond taken for taxes due before the first day of January, seventeen hundred and eighty-three; and the said agent shall also superintend the collection of all balances due on bonds installed, or otherwise, for the emissions of paper money of seventeen hundred and sixty-nine, and seventeen hundred and seventy-three.

XIV. And be it enacted, That no process shall iffue against any of the public debtors, unless by the direction of the faid agent.

XV. And be it enacled, That the faid agent shall have

power to fix such days of sale of property taken by fieri faciar, at the suit of the state, as he may think proper, always taking care to give at least twenty days public notice thereof; and the said agent shall also have power to suspend the sales, from time to time, as he

XVI. And be it enasted, That the said agent shall pay into the treasury, in specie, the amount of all specie by him received in the discharge of the duties of this act.

XVII. And be it enasted, That in all cases where bonds shall be taken in virtue of this act, the bonds shall be a lien on all the real property of the obligors from the date thereof, or on so much of the said real property as the governor and council shall think sufficiproperty as the governor and council shall think suffici-ent, to be particularly mentioned in a schedule to be annexed to the said bond, in which case it shall be a lien on the property contained in such schedule, and no more, fuch bond, and schedule to be lodged with the

XVIII. And be it enacted, That all bonds taken in virtue of this act shall express the county in which the obligors respectively reside, and the treasurer of the western shore shall, within one month after he receives them respectively, cause them, with the schedule annexed to them, to be recorded in the office of the clerk of the general court of the western shore, at the expense of the obligors; and a copy of the said record, pence of the obligors; and a copy of the faid record, certified under the hand and official feal of the faid clerk, shall be as good evidence in any court of law or equity duced; and if any of the obligors in any fuch bonds reside on the eastern shore, the said treasurer shall, within six months from the time he receives the same respectively, transmit to the clerk of the general court of the eastern shore, in the same manner as papers on public service are transmitted, a copy of such bonds and schedules, certified as aforesaid by the clerk of the general court of the weltern flore, to be recorded in the office of the clerk of the general court of the eaftern flore, at the expence of the obligors, and in such case a copy of the said record; certified as aforesaid by the clerk of the general court of the eastern flore, shall be good evidence as aforesaid.

LETTER from Rastadt, dated 1st December, A fays, "When the Swedish ambassador, count Ferion, fent his card to general Buonaparte, the latter answered, "I do not know him, nor will I see him."

Count Ferson was formerly colonel in the French
guards and a favourite of the late queen, he made
several fruitless attempts to rescue her from confinement. It was by order of the French Directory that Buonaparte returned the above answer. Count Metternich, the Imperial plenipotentiary, who passed yesterday through Aughburg, is expected here to morrow; his arrival in this city has, we understand, been prevented from a point of eitquette, the Imperial court having entertained a wish that the French plenipotentiaries thould arrive here fooner than the Imperial minister. Hopes are entertained here, that the congress will become general, and that Great-Britain, congrets will occome general, and that Great-Britain, Spain and Holland, will fend plenipotentiaries to open negotiations for a general peace. The Margrave of Baden has presented general Buonaparte with a beautiful carriage. On the part of the Hanseatic cities Hamburg, Lubeck, and Bremen, Messrs. Dorman, Robbe, and Gaoning, are arrived here. The report of an important change intended to be made at the congress, in regard of these cities is without founda-
