CLAES ULRIC GRILL, Esquire, having produced to me his commission as vice-consul of his ma-jety the king of Sweden for the ports of Baltimore, Ancapolis, and Chester-town, in the State of Maryland, I do hereby recognize him as such, and declare him tree to exercise and enjoy such sunctions, powers, and privileges, as are allowed to consuls of his taid miedy, the king of Sweden, by the laws and treaties in that cafe made and provided.

In teltimony whereof I have caused these letters to be made patent, and the feal of the United

States to be hereunto affixed.

Given under my hand, at the city of Philadelphia, the twenty ninth day of March, in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and ninety-eight, and of the independence of the faid States the twenty-fecond JOHN ADAMS.

BE it enacted, by the General Assembly of Maryland, Trat in all and every case where the sheriff or heft rof any county within this ftate fhall hereafter levy, and collect or receive, or ought to levy and colleft, any fum or fums of money or tobacco for the ule of any perion or perions whatfoever, and shall refuse or neglect to pay over the same to the person or persons, or to he order of the person or persons, entitled or auth ried to receive the fame, by the time required by lav, it field and may be lawful, and the feveral county courts or general court, as the case may be, are hereby required, upon motion made on benalf of the person or versons entitled or authorised to receive the money or tibacco levied and collected as aforefaid, or which ought to be levied and collected as aforefaid, and on producing to the court before whom fuch motion shall be made a stated account of the demand, supported by fuch afficiavit or voucher as the court shall reasonably require, to order a judgment to be entered, and an amediate execution to iffue thereon, against the pera or property of fuch theriff or collector, to levy and simpel the payment of such sum of money or tobacco o die and payable; provided, that a copy of the demand, and notice of fuch intended motion, be deliered in writing to fuch theriff or collector, or left at his last place of abode, for the space of twenty days reviews to the fitting of the court at which such aplication shall be intended, and that proof thereof be made to the satisfaction of the court; and provided to, that if such sheriff or collector shall, in person or by attorney, controvers the demand, and desire a jury be impannelled to afcertain the fum of money really bue and pavable, the court thall direct a jury to be imediately impannelled and charged to try and afcertain in iffue, whether the faid theriff or collector be chargeele with and liable to pay any and what fum or fums of money or tobacco to the person or persons so claimng and authorifed to receive the same; and the court te hereby empowered and required, upon such verdict of the jury, to pass judgment against the said sheriff or sulfilor, upon which there shall be no writ of error, stroffdeas, injunction or appeal, and to award execution there on as upon all other cases of judgment had in
