BE it enalled, by the General Affembly of Maryland, That William Marbury be agent of this state, to execute the trust and power reposed in him by virtue of thin act, from the first day of January, one thousand feren hundred and ninety-nine, until the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred.

11. And be it enalled, That the faidvagent superintend also collection of all arreagues and balances due form

### HAGUE, November 6.

WITHIN these few days past, the guards have been every where doubled, and fimilar pre-cautions have been taken in the other cities. In con-fequence of the intelligence that the infurrection in Flanders threatened to fpresd fill further, the Directory issued an order for the rigid execution of the laws against emigrants and French banished criminals, and for arrefting all the Brabanters who shall have taken part in the infurrection, and that they shall be immediately given up to the French government.

#### VIENNA, November 36.

We can with certainty acquaint the public that the Ruffian auxiliary troops, 24,000 men, arrived the 27th October in Gallicia; prince Ferdinand of Wirtemberg has taken the command of them. The 12th of the month they are expected at Cracow, to take their march to Zniam in Moravia, where they expect fur ther orders.

#### PRANCFORT, November 17.

By the lateft letters received from Italy we have the news that every thing is perfectly tranquil in Alexandria. They took the greatest pains to put every thing in the best state of defence. There were two Venetian thips of the lines one galley, four half galleys, nine friggres, fixty large and friell veffels, and two hundred Suez. His army confilts of 30,000 men, of which godo Egyptians are in actual fervice.
