WHEREAS by an all of congress, passed on the fixteenth day of July, in the year of our Lord, one thousand seven hunred and ninety-eight, the prefident of the United States is authorifed to borrow, on behalf of the United States, from the bank of the United States, or from any other body or hodles, politic or corporate, or from any per-on or perfort, and upon such term and conditions as he shall judge most advantageous for the United States, a fum not exceeding five millions of dollarsto, however, that no contract or engagement be made which shall preclude the United States from reimburfing any fum or fums borrowed at any; time after the expiration of fifteen years from the date of such loan. And ruberene it is declared by the faid act, that fo much as may be necessary of the surplus of the duties on imports and tunnage, beyond the permanent appropriations heretofore charged upon them, by law, shall be pledged and appropriated for paying the interest, and also for paying and discharging the principal fum or iums of all the monies which may be borrowed, according to the term or terms which may be fixed, pursuant to the authority aforesaid—And rubereas by the said act, the faith of the United States is piedged to establish sufficient permanent revenues for making up any deficiency that may hereafter appear in the provisions before mentioned for paying the interest and principal sums, or either of them, of any monies which may be borrowed pursuant to the faid aft.
