I have thought proper to recommend; and I do hereby recommend accordingly; that Thursday, the 26th and April post, he observed, throughous the 1 day of April next, be observed throughout the U-nited States of America; as a day of solemn humilfaone faiting and prayer. That the citizens on that day, abstaining as far as 'may be from their feenlar occupations, devote the time to the facred duties of occupations, devote the time to the facted duties of religion, in public and in private f. That they call to mind our numerous offences against the most High GOD, confess them before him with the fincereft penitence, implore his pardoning mercy, through the great Mediator and Redeemer, for our palt transgreffions, and that, through the grace of his Holy Spirit, we may be disposed and enabled to yield a more suitable obedience is his righteous requisitions in time to come: That he would interpose to arrest the progress of that Impiety and licentiousness in principle and practice, fo offenfive to himfelt and fo rulnous to mankind : That he would make us deeply fenfible to mankind: I nat he would make us deeply fentile that "righteoulness exalteth a nation, but lin is the reproach of any people?" That he would turn us from our transgressions and turn his displeasure from us: That he would withhold us from unreasonable discontent-from disunion, faction, fedition and infurrection : That he would preserve our country from the desolating sword: That he would save our cities and towns from a repetition of those awful pestilential vilitations under which they have fately suffered so feverely, and that the health of our inhabitants generally may be precious in his fight: That he would favour us with fruitful feasons, and so bless the labours of the husbandmen as that there may be food in abundance for man and beaft : That he would profper our commerce; manitfactures and fifheries, and per our commerce, manusactures and inheries, and give success to the people in all their lawful industry and enterprize: That he would smile on our colleges, academics, schools and seminaries of learning, and make them nurferies of found science, morals and religion: That he would bless all magistrates from the highest to the lowest, give them the spirit of their flation, make them a terror to evil doers and a praise notion, man do well: That he would preside over the councils of the nation at this critical period, enlighten them to's just discernment of the public intereit, and save them from mittake, division and discord: That he would succeed our preparations for defence, and blefs our atmaments by land and by fea : That he would put an end to the effution of human blood, and the accumulation of human milery, among the contending nations of the earth, by disposing them to juilice, to equity, to benevolence and to peace; And that he would extend the blessings of knowledge; of true liberty, and of pure and un-defiled religion, throughout the world.

And I do, also, recommend that with these acts of humiliation, penitence and prayer, fervent thankf-giving to the author of all good be united, for the countless favours which he is still continuing to the people of the United States, and which render their condition as a nation eminently happy, when com-

pared with the lot of others.
