A By-law to prevent the introduction of the small pox into-the city of Annapolis, or the precincts thereof.

BE it established and ordained, by the mayor, recorder; aldermen, and common council of the city of Annapolit, and the authority of the same, That whatever inhabitant of the faid city, or the precincts thereof, shall introduce or bring the small-pox into this city, or the pre-cincle thereof, by inoculation, or shall take or receive into his or her house or family any person whatever, not being an inhabitant of the said city, or the precinds thereof, who either is at the time, or comes to town to be infected with, the small pox, in order to nurse or tend such person in that distemper, knowing fuch person to be then infected, or that such person came to town with defign to be infected, with such diffemper, such inhabitant to introducing or bringing the small-pox into this city, or the precincts thereof, by inoculation, or taking or receiving at any time any fuch person, not an inhabitant as aforelaid, fliall, for every fuch offence, forfeit and pay the fum of three pounds current money, to be recovered by indistment or confession to the use of the corporation.

And be it efiablished and ordained, by the authority aforesaid, That every inhabitant of this city, or the precincts thereof, who shall offend as aforesaid, shall, for every twenty-four hours that any such person as aforesaid, not an inhabitant as aforesaid, shall continue in the house or family of such inhabitant, sorfeit and pay the further sum of three pounds current money aforesaid, to be recovered as aforesaid, to the use aforefaid.

Provided always, That this by law, nor any thing herein contained, shall extend, or be construed to extend, to the taking or receiving of such person who, coming to this city, or the precincts thereof, about his necessary business, shall have been or shall be casually insected with the said distemper, and taken so ill as that it may be unfase for such person to retire from the city, or the precincts thereof.
