As ACT to appoint an agent for the year one thousand eight hundred.

BE it enalled, by the General Assembly of Maryland, That William Marbury be agent of this state, to execute the trust and power reposed in him by virtue of this act, from the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred, until the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred, and one. fand eight hundred and one.

Il. And be it enadled, That the faid agent fuperintend the collection of all arrearages and balances due from the feveral collectors of the respective counties within this flate; and the faid agent is hereby authorifed and required to call upon the treasurers of the respective shores for an accurate statement of all arreas ges and balances oue from such collectors, and such accounts shall be surnished by the said treasurers accordingly.

III. And be it enaled, That the faid agent be authorifed to inperintend the collection of balances due to the flate on the auditor's books, or on open account; and the faid agent shall have power to require payment of, and, if necessary, to sue for and recover the same; and the said agent, with the approbation of the governot and council, may make composition with any such debtors, and take bonds to the state, with sufficient se-carity, and give time for payment, not exceeding two years from the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred.

IV. ded be it enacled, That the faid agent be authorifed to imperintend the collection of all monies due to rited to imperiment the collection of all monies due to the flate for naval duties, fines, penalties, forfeitures and americaments, and forfeited recognizances, and for ordinary, retailers and marriage licences, and to require payment, and, if necessary, sue for and recover the same; and the said agent may allow for infolvencies, and credit any money that the party is not chargeable with but law and for his information of the law with by law, and for his information of the law, he may take the advice of the attorney-general in

V. 3nd be it enalled, That whenever there shall be occasion to expose to public sale the property of any collector, or his fecurities, by virtue of any execution already islued, or to be iffued for this purpose, the said arroady flued, or to be flued for this purpole, the faid agent shall cause at least thirty days public notice to be given of such sale, and shall attend the same, and if it shill appear that there is danger of losing any part of the debt due to the state, and not otherwise, shall purchase any property so exposed to sale for the use of the state, in payment, or part payment, as the case may be, the transparents of the treaters whose property of the arrearages due by the collectors whose property may be so purchased, and that no purchase authorised by this act shall be considered as made on the part of the fire, unless a public declaration to that effect be nade by the agent; or his deputy, immediately after such fale and purchase; and any property so purchased for the use of the state, the said agent may again expose to public auction on the most advantageous terms, for the we of the state, and if the same be fold on credit, which shall in no case exceed the term of two years, the aid agent shall take bond, with good and sufficient se-cuity, to be approved of by the treasurer of the wel-tern shore, from the purchasers of such property, and all bonds by him so taken shall be deposited, with an accurate lift thereof subscribed by him, in the treasury of the wellern shore, and shall be a sien upon the real property of such purchasers, and their securities, from the respective, dates, or so much thereof as is mentioned in the schedule thereto annexed.

VI. And be it enadled, That the faid agent is herely directed to dispare of all confiscated British property that remains unfold, and take bonds to the flate, with fufficient fecurity, and give time for the payment thereof, not exceeding two years from the first day January, one thousand eight hundred, and that the quantity of land in any one body subit to fuch fale exceeds the quantity of fifty acres, fich land shall be disposed of at public sale, of the time and place of which sale at least thirty days previous nofice thall be given by public advertisement; and that at the time of any tate by virtue of this act, the faid agent fail, make known that he only fells the right of this fair thereto, and that the flate doth not guaranty the lite to the fame, or any part thereof, but that the purchase must be in 'all respects at the risk of the pur-

IX. And be it enalled, That the agent, with the approbation and confent of the governor and council, be and he is hereby authorifed and empowered to compromife any fuit depending in chancery with any state debtor, upon any terms in their judgment calculated to promote the interest of the state, and to obtain the

promote the interest of the state, and to obtain the speedy receipt of the sums due.

X. And be it enalled, That is, under the terms of any compromite made as aforesaid, the property heretosore purchased should be taken back and revested in the state, the same may be sold by the agent, and he is hereby authorised and empowered to sell the sime at public sale, giving thirty days notice, on a credit of two years, payable one half of the principal, and the whole interest, annually, on the first day of December in each year, and the bonds, when taken, shall be returned to the treasury of the western shore, and reported to the general assembly at their session next ensuing the taking of such bonds.

XI. And be it enalled, That all cases in chancery, where no compromite under this act is effected, shall be placed under the direction of the agent, who is hereby

placed under the direction of the agent, who is hereby authorifed and require: to call on the attorn y-general to profecute or defend the fame to immediate final de-ction; and the governor and council are hereby authorifed and empowered, at the request of the agent, in riled and empowered, at the request of the agent, in cases of difficulty, to aid the attorney general, by employing any person to attend to surveys where netestary, or otherwise to affist in the prosecution or defence of fair suits, which person or persons are to be paid out of the contingent fund of five hundred pounds; and the names of the persons so employed, together with the names of the perions to employed, together with the fum allowed for their fervices, to be laid before

XII. And be it enabled, That if any bond debtor to the state for confidated property purchased, or otherwise, shall neglect to make payment agreeably to the condition of his bond, and sundry resolves of the general assumption. neral allembly, the faid agent shall cause process to iffur for the whole principal and interest then due, or shall proceed on any execution already issued, and served and furpended, as occasion may require, or, under the directions and with the approbation of the governor and

council, he is hereby authorifed to delay any execution as long as they may think expedient and neverly XIII. And be it enaded, That the faid agent be authorifed to superintend the collection of all balances due on bond taken for t-xes due before the first day of January, one thousand seven hundred and eighty-thir and the faid agent shall also superintend the collection of all balances due on bonds installed, or otherwise, for the emissions of paper money of one thousand seven hundred and fixty, nine, and one thousand seven hundred and seventy-three.

XVI. And be it enalted, That the said agent shall pay into the treasury, in specie, the amount of all specie by him received in the discharge of the duries of this act.

XVII. And be it enalled, That in all cases where bonds shall be taken in virtue of this act, the bonds shall be a lien on the real property of the obligors from the date thereof, or on so much of the said real property as the governor and council shall think sufficient, to be particularly mentioned in a schedule to be annexed to the said bond, in which case it shall be a lien on the property contained in such schedule, and no more, such bond and schedule to be lodged with the treasurer of the western shore.

XVIII. And be st enasted, That all bonds taken in

virtue of this act shall express the county in which the obligors respectively reside, and the treasurer of the western shore shall, within one month after he receives them respectively, cause them, with the schedule annexed to them, to be recorded in the office of the clerk of the general court of the western shore, at the expence of the obligors; and a copy of the taid record, certified under the hand and official scal of the said clerk, shall be as good evidence in any court of law or equity in this sate as the original bond would be if it was produted; and if any of the obligors in any fuch bonds refide on the eaftern fhore, the faid treasurer shall, within six months from the time he receives the same respectively, transmit to the clerk of the general court of the eaftern shore, in the same manner as papers on public se vice are transmitted, a copy of such honds and schedules, certified as aforesaid by the clerk of the general court of the western shore, to be recorded in the office of the clerk of the general court of the eaf-tern shore, at the expence of the obligers, and in such case a copy of the said record, certified as aforesaid by

case a copy of the said record, certified as aforesaid by the clerk of the general court of the eastern shore, shall be good evidence as aforesaid.

XIX. And he it exacted, That the said agent shall render to the treasurer of the western shore distinct quarterly accounts of his receipts of all money, certificates and honds, in virtue of this act, and shall immediately thereupon pay and deliver the same to the said treasurer, who shall, in his annual report to the general assembly, state sully and particularly the money, certificates and honds, by him received from the said agent, and the times when the same were reserved and accounted for. times when the fame were reseived and accounted for.

XX. And be it enalted, That the faid agent shall render a fair and sull account of his several proceedings under the authority of this act to the general assembly at their next session, and within the first ten days after its commencement, in which account shall be specified, under distinct heads, his own receipts, and those of the treasurer, and of all transfers of stock upon which he may be entitled to commission, and in which shall also be contained a particular estimate of his commission, shewing how and upon what the same arose due.

XXI. And be it enalted, That the said agent shall, within twenty days after the commencement of the next session of the legislature a fair and distinct account of the debts or sums of money due to the state, ranging the names of the debtors in alphabetical order, and give sull and complete information of the manner in which, and the time when, each debt arose, and also the different steps and proceedings which have been taken by himself, or others, for the recovery thereof.

XXII. And be it enacted. That the said agent shall be allowed for his services the following commissions, to wit: for all paymens actually made to either of the treasurers in virtue of this act, three per cent, and for all bonds taken by the laid agent in virtue of this act, three per cent. XXIII. VENICE, November 12. NCONA has not yet fallen-General Frolich is A forced to befiege it regularly.—The French have made a strong sortress of this place in a short time, and the Italian Jacobins who are in it, in conjunction with the garrison, make a desperate refittance.

November 13. The fiege of Ancona is one of the most obstinate which has been carried on during the present war. On the 2d instant the French made a desperate sortie to drive the Austrians from the hill, where the Lazaretto stands, and from which place the fortress may be bombarded. After a warm combat they were obliged to return to the city with the lofs of 350 men killed and wounded. General Monnier and another were wounded. The Russian and Turkish frigates were veather to give up the blockade of Ancona; but the Imperial bomb vessels, which were built there, have anchored in the road of Ancona, and keep the port blockaded; they have taken feyeral French vessels laden with provisions going into that

MANHEIM, November 22.

Couriers are exchanged almost every day, between this capital and Paris. It is said that general Lecourbe has demanded his dismission, and that general Moreauhas received orders speedily to inspect all the armies of the republic, after which he will take upon himself the chief command of the army of the Rhine, which is to be increased to 100,000 men before the end of February. Philipfburg will not be able to hold out a long blockade, the principal part of the French army being now before it, and its garrifon having, during the last blockede, lost 700 men, who were to have joined general Gorger. Divisions of troops are contimeally arriving here from Alface, to reinforce the
