Don Valentine de Foranda, having produced to me his commission as consul-general of the Spanish nation within the United States of America, I do hereby recognize him as fuch, and do declare him free to exercife and enjoy such functionary powers and privi-leges, as are allowed to consuls of the said nation by the treaty fublifting between the United States and his Catholic majesty.

In tellimony whereof I have caused these letters to be made patent, and the feal of the United States to be hereunto af-

fixed.

Given under my hand at the city of Washington, the twenty-ninth day of January, in the year of our Lord, one thousand eight hundred and two, and of the independence of the United States of America the twenty-fixth.

Extract of a letter from William Kirkbatrick, Esq; dated Malaga, 97th November, 1801, to the sccretary of state.

" Commodore Dale, called in here on the 4th inft. in the frigate President, accompanied by the Philadelphia and Essex. The commodore proceeded on the 9th inft. for Mahon, to inquire into the truth of fome cruisers, faid to have been fitted out at that island, for the purpose of capturing American and Swedish vessels, as mentioned in the enclosed copy of a letter from our minister at Madrid. This information I now learn by a letter from Robert Montgomery, Efq; conful at Alicant, dated 12th inft. to be falfe. He favs "the report of Tripoline cruifers having heen fitted out at Mahon is falle, and contradicted by the arrival of a Swedish frigate from that port, a few days ago." The Philadelphia proceeds up the Mediterranean with a convoy of American and Swedish vessels, and the Essex is now cruising in the Gut, watching the motions of the two Tripoline cruifers, laid up at Gibraltar.

" Advices from every quarter afford me room to think, that none of our vessels have yet fallen into the hands of the Tripolines, which is a flattering circumfance, confidering the great number that have ventured up and down the Mediterranean, without any protection whatever. A Swedish frigate is daily expected from Alicant with a convoy bound out of the Straits, and it is faid three more are on their

way from Sweden."

Two of these vessels are expected home, in virtue of orders given the 15th of December laft. The terms of fervice for which the crews of thefe vessels entered, will expire on or about the 1st of

The Chesapeake, the Constellation, and the schr' Enterprize, destined for the Mediterranean, are nearly in a state of complete preparation for sea. necessary order for officering, manning, provisioning, and otherwise equipping them, has been given; and it is presumed they will be ready to sail on or before the 20th of the ensuing month.

The Constitution, at Boston, and the Adams, at New-York, are undergoing necessary repairs. The repairs of the Constitution will be completed in the New-York, are undergoin repairs of the Conflictation course of three months; those of the Adams will be effected in one month.

The frigates United States, Congress, New-York John Adams and General Greene, are dismantled and laid up, in ordinary, in the Eastern Branch. They are officered and manned agreably to the quota pre-fcribed by the act, entitled, "An act providing for a naval peace establishment." These vessels are in such a state, that they might all be prepared for service on or before the IR of March next.
