ORDERED, That the bill entitled, An act to alter, changes and abolifh, all fuch parts of the conflitution and form of government as relate to the time and manner of electing the lenate, and the mode of filling up vacancies in that body, together with an extract from the journals of the fenate relative thereto, be published for the information of the people, once a week, for the space of three weeks, in the American, Telegraphe, the National Intelligencer, Maryland Gazette, Bartgis's paper, at Frederick-town, Mr. Smith's paper, at Easton, and Mr. Grieves's paper, at Hagar's-town.

An ACT to alter, change, and abblish, all such parts of the constitution and form of government as relate to the time and manner of electing the senate, and the mode of filling up vacancies in that body.

BEIT ENACTED, by the General Assembly of Many of Mand, That from and after the _____ day of , the fenate of this state shall consist and be composed of twenty members, one member to be chosen from each of the several counties of this state, and one flember from the city of Baltimore; and that the fenators shall be elected for four years by the electors in the feveral counties, and in the city of Baltimore, qualified to vote for members of the house of delegates, at the same time, in the same manner, and at the same places, where they shall vote for members of the house of delegates.

And be it enacted, That no person shall be a fenator who shall not have attained the age of twentyfive years, and been a refident of the state four years next before his election, and the last year thereof a relident of the county or city for which he shall be elected, unless he thall have been absent on the public business of the United States or of this state, and having in the state real and personal property above

the value of ____ dollars.

And be it enacted, That immediately after the fepators shall be affembled in confequence of the first election, they shall be divided by lot into four clusses; the feats of the fenators of the first class shall be vacated at the expiration of the first year, of the second class at the expiration of the second year, of the third class at the expiration of the third year, and of the fourth class at the expiration of the fourth year, fo that one fourth may be chosen every year; and if the feat of any fenator shall become vacant by death, relignation or otherwise, a warrant of election shall iffue by the president of the senate for the election of another in his place, in the fame manner, and under the fame regulations, as warrants of election are iffued by the speaker of the house of delegates, to supply vacancies in that body; and any fenator who may be elected to fill a vacancy shall hold his feat fo long as the person in whose place he is elected might have done if no vacancy had happened.

And be it enacted, That if this act shall be con-

firmed by the general affembly, after the next elec-tion of delegates, in the first session after such new election, as the constitution and form of government directs, that in such case this act, and the alterations and amendment of the constitution and form of government therein contained, shall be taken and confidered, and thall conflitute and be valid, as a part of the faid constitution and form of government, to all intents and purposes, any thing in the faid conflitu-tion and form of government to the contrary not-

withstanding.

And be it enacted, That the fourteenth, fifteenth, fixteenth, seventeenth, eighteenth and nineteenth sections of the constitution and form of government, shall be, and are hereby declared to be, repealed and abolished on the confirmation hereof.
