.. C O Ro K, August 8. A PROCLAMATION,

BY THE .. Lord Lieutenant and Council of Ireland.

HARDWICKE, In purfuence of an act passed on the twenty-ninth day of July last, for the Suppression of the rebellion now existing in Ireland:

His excellency the lord lieutenant has issued his orders to the officers commanding his majefty's forces, to take the most vigorous and effectual measures for supporting the said rebellion which shall appear to be necessary for the public safety; and for safety and protection of the persons and properties of his majefty's peaceable and loyal subjects, and to punish all perions acting, aiding, or in any manner affilting in the faid rebellion, or malicibully attacking or in-juring the perions or properties of his majefly's loyal fubjects in furtherance of the fame, by martial law, either: by death or otherwise, as to them shall seem expedient, for the punishment and suppression of all rebels in the feveral districts, and to arrell and detain into custody all persons engaged in slich rebellion, or suspected thereof, and to cause all persons so arrested and detained in custody to be brought to trial in a summary manner by courts martial, to be assembled and constituted as in his excellency's said orders, particularly expressed for all offences committed in furtherance of the faid rebellion, whether fuch persons shall have been taken in open arms against his majefty, or shall have been otherwise concerned in the said rebellion, or in aiding or in any manner assisting the fame, and to execute the fentence of all such courts martials whether of death or otherwife, and to do all other acts necessary for such several pur-

And we, the lord lieutenant and council of Ireland; do hereby, in pursuance of the faid act, firicily enjoin and command all his majesty's subjects in every part of Ireland to aid and affill, to the utmost of their power, the due execution of the orders to issued by his excellency, the lord lieutenant, in pursuance of the faid act.

Given in the council chamber, in Dublin, the first day of August, 1803.
