On motion, the question was put, That the following be received as an amendment to the said bill? provided always, and be it enacted, That nothing in this act contained shall have any effect or operation unless the same shall be assented to by a majority of all the members of the first branch of the city council, after a new election of members, in the first week after such new election." Resolved in the affirmative, yeas 30, nays 29.

On motion, the question was put, That the following be received as an amendment to the said bill? and provided also, that the same be assented to by a majority of the members of the second branch of said city council." Determined in the negative, yeas 28, nays 32.

The question was then put, That the further consideration thereof be postponed till the first day of next? Determined in the negative.

On motion, the question was put, That the following be received as an amendment to the said bill? and shall also be ratified and confirmed by an act of the general assembly of this state, after such assent as aforesaid shall be duly notified to them." Determined in the negative.

On motion, the question was put, That the following be received as an amendment to the said bill? and be it enacted, That all powers now vested in the corporation of the city of Baltimore for the regulation of weights and measures, and all ordinances the said corporation imposing the expenses of weighing, measuring or inspecting, any articles brought to the said city for sale, wholly or unequally on the seller, shall be, and the same are hereby repealed, revoked and repealed." Determined in the affirmative, yeas 30, nays 32.

The bill being read throughout, the question was put, That the said bill do pass? Resolved in the affirmative, yeas 33, nays 28.

BOSTON, December 20.
On Tuesday last the ship Nabby arrived at Port from Liverpool. Captain McLellan, the owner, evening favoured us with Liverpool papers to Number 10, received by her. The conquest of England had not been attempted at the time of her departure, but the papers are filled with paragraphs, which show that the threatened visit from the French is daily expected. If the statements, very copiously made, are to be credited, a sufficient number of boats were already prepared for the transportation of the Gallic troops, and a large proportion of the ships to be employed in the expedition on the coast for embarkation; 170,000 are said to have landed in the vicinity of Brest, destined against Ireland. Buonaparte was at Paris the 28th of October.

LIVERPOOL, November 10.
Extract of a letter from London, November 8.
The note of preparation on this side of the water has increased in a singular manner since my last; hottest press for seamen, ever known, took place down the river late on Monday evening; and of a great number of men were taken; probably between the river and the Nore nearly 1000. It is further understood, that to carry the regulations lately issued upon for resisting an invasion into the most accurate and immediate effect, the lords lieutenants of counties have been ordered, by his majesty's sign manual, to take the most prompt measures for driving the removing horses, corn, breaking up of roads, &c. The northern coast of this kingdom is to be strengthened without delay; a party of the artillery, bearing 6 field pieces, 6 carriage guns, 12 ammunition waggons, broad waggons, &c. set out on Monday from Woolwich, for Lynemouth and Hull, and other detachments is ready to follow them. In fact, speedy and terrible conflict is now looked for with confidence, and from the peculiar state of this country rather courted than otherwise.

By Dutch papers it appears that the head quarters of The French and Batavian armies are fixed at Utrecht.
Dispatches have been sent to Plymouth, to be forwarded with all possible expedition to Lord Nelson, in the Mediterranean. They are to be sent out by the ship, of 38 guns, capt. Wilkinson. Government has received undoubted intelligence of the design of Buonaparte to attempt the landing of a considerable force in Egypt.
The Huzar will, it is said, be followed by four frigates of the line and some frigates, to reinforce our fleet in that quarter.

PHILADELPHIA, December 20.
A fleet of vessels, under convoy of 6 ships of the line, were seen on the 14th inst. in lat. 25, long. 63, whole amounting to about 63 sail. Circumstances lead it probable, that these vessels may be the fleet reported to have sailed from Brest, on the 8th of November, of which an account was received from the British frigate Thunderer. In that case, it is presumed, they are destined against some of the British possessions in the India islands.

"New-York, Dec. 28.
This morning arrived the British letter of marque Active, capt. Arnet. She sailed from Port Antonio the 1st inst. in company with 40 odd sail of merchantmen, bound home, and parted from us on the 14th inst. off Crooked Island. On the 20th she fell in with a British 74, in company with a frigate which she had captured."

Capt. Bennet, of the Catharine, from Bourdeaux, arrived at New-York, informs, that just before he sailed, 20,000 troops marched through that city, supposed to be destined against Portugal.

Annapolis, January 5.
This morning, about one o'clock, the house occupied by Mr. G. J. Grammer was discovered to be on fire, and the alarm bell sounded, but notwithstanding the exertions of the citizens, and the members of the general assembly, the house was entirely consumed, with the kitchen and carriage-houses, happily no other damage was done, though a number of houses were in imminent danger. By this unhappy accident Mr. Grammer is a very considerable sufferer.
