A petition from fundry inhabitants of New-Maret, in Dorchester county, was preferred and read.

The question was put, That the further consideration of the bill respecting taxes on judicial proceedings, and on the proceedings in the land-office, and for other purpoles, be postponed till the next session of affembly? Refolved in the affirmative.

The bill for the benefit of Arthur Thompson, of Saint-Mary's county, was passed and sent to the se-

A refolution directing the treasurer to subscribe for shares in the bank of Baltimore, was propounded to the house and read.

Ordered. That the committee of claims allow to John Trueman, door-keeper to the boule of delegates, fixty dollars, for taking care of the chamber and furniture belonging to this house during the recess of

the legislature. Ordered, That the committee of claims allow the reveiend Mr. Wyatt the fum of eighty dollars for his services as chaplain during the present session.
