HOUSE OF DELEGATES.

WEDNESDAY, January 9, 1805. HE house met. Present as on yesterday. The

proceedings of yesterday were read. The clerk of the fenate delivers the bill authoriting the levy courts of Kent and Queen-Anne's counties to levy a fum of money for building a bridge over Chefter river, and the bill to release unto James Mosher the right of the state to a lot or parcel of ground therein mentioned, feverally endorfed, " will pass;" which were ordered to be engrossed; the bill for the benefit of Jacob Parrell, and the bill to authorife the kyr court of Anne-Arundel county to affels and levy fam of money for the purpose therein mentioned, Freally endorsed, " will not pass;" also a letter from his excellency the governor, enclosing a letter from the treasurer, notifying his receipt of an order in the bank of discount and deposit in Baltimore for the second instalment due on the loan to the city of

On motion, the question was put, Will the house give the bill to withdraw certain funds from the cities of Baltimore, Annapolis, and the town of Easton, and a certain part of faid funds from Saint-John's college, and placing the same in the respective treafuries, subject to the appropriation of the legislature, a second reading? Determined in the negative.
