SKETCH OF PROCEEDINGS.

HOUSE OF DELEGATES.

THURSDAY, December 19, 1805. THE house met. Present as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

A petition from Anne Clarke, Henry Lowe Hall and Francis Hall, of Prince-George's county, a petition from William Sentee, of Harford county, and a petition from Marsham Parker, of Calvert county, were read and referred.

Ordered, .That the bill to alter the time of the meeting of the general affembly of this state, and for other purpoles, have a second reading on Tuesday the

The report on the petition of Charles Gardiner was read the second time and the resolution therein af-
