

We are told (says a Salem paper) a letter was yesterday received in town from Mr. Cowinshield, at Washington, informing, that the Spanish court, by request of our executive, had recalled the Spanish ambassador, the marquis Yrujo. The interference of this officer, we believe, has been troublesome to our government.

Pennsylvania Hospital, December 27.
On Wednesday the 25th inst, a WEN was extracted by Dr. Phyllick, in the circular room, from the cheek and neck of James Hayes, of Dauphin county, in the state of Pennsylvania, in the presence of Doctors Willar and Cox, physicians of the hospital; and about eighty students of medicine from different parts of the union, who were privileged to attend the practice of the house.
This wen had been upwards of 20 years progressing in its growth, and when extracted, it was measured and weighed.—The dimensions were as follow:
Projection from his cheek 7 1/2 inches,
Circumference round the base 23,
Circumference in its largest extent 25 1/2,
Ditto in the least part of it 19 1/2,
The weight was 7 pounds.
It is supposed the patient might have lost about 10 or 12 ounces of blood. This severe operation he bore with the greatest fortitude, and there is a reasonable prospect of his doing well.

Extract of a letter from Charles Martin, Esq; post-master at Waterford, Erie county, to a gentleman in Lancaster, dated Dec. 5, 1805.
"Judson and Isaac Farren are just returned from Detroit. They bring bad news from that place.—That the Indians are gathering in force and threaten Detroit with a second conflagration. The people are in great alarm, and turning out to arms in every direction. If they had not come away the day they did, they would have been enrolled in the militia next day. This I suppose is owing to the withdrawing of the troops as there is now only a part of a company of artilleers there under captain Dyson."

His excellency the governor has communicated to both branches of the legislature a circular letter from the secretary at war, signifying, that an immediate draught of the militia of this state may be called for by the general government. This, it is supposed, will occupy their immediate attention.—[Louisville Gaz.]

By a gentleman passenger in the Martha Crawley, we are favoured with the following information: That Josiah Blakely, Esq; late American consul at St. Jago, had been persecuted to such a degree by the Spanish government, as to have been obliged to embark from that place, in consequence of a sentence lately passed at Havana against him, which threatened him with imprisonment.

This gentleman also informs us, that most of the French privateers in Cuba had assumed the Spanish flag, in consequence of the persecution they had recently experienced from the more effectual measures lately manifested by the Spanish government, to suppress and punish their piracies; and that, in consequence of the representations of our government, the late French agents at St. Jago, from Guadalupe and St. Domingo, had been proceeded, and commissioners sent to examine into their transactions, as relates to American captures. When this gentleman left Havana, there were four American vessels taken by Spanish privateers and sent into different ports, the west end of the island, under adjudication at Havana. But there had been no captures in that quarter of the island by French privateers since the month of May last. He describes the Spaniards as in a state of the utmost inquietude and anxiety, fearing a war between the United States and Spain; and that their sole dependence, in that island, being on the American commerce, he is of opinion, from the prevailing sentiments of the planters, in case of such an event, they would willingly place themselves under the protection of the United States. [Charleston Times.]

An authentic letter from Bourdeaux to a person in this city, states, that the French lost in the fair of Ulm, 16,000 men killed.
The source from which this information is derived, is so respectable, that we place great reliance on its accuracy. If it be correct, it gives a totally different colour to the affairs of the continent, from that in which they have been recently exhibited. [Nat. Int.]

Capt. Bell, from Russia, (arrived at Boston) informs, that on the 20th September, the Emperor Alexander, left Petersburg, to head 300,000 men, destined for Germany; that the war was very popular, and that soldiers exempted from service were petitioning to be admitted.

On Monday the 23d ult. in the house of representatives of the United States, Mr. Dawson brought forward the resolutions, which in substance, follow:
1st. That 150,000 dollars be appropriated to the better security of ports, harbours, &c.
2d. That 250,000 dollars be appropriated for the building of gun-boats.
3d. That 600,000 dollars be appropriated to the building of six line of battle ships.
Referred to the committee of the whole on the state of the Union.
