SKETCH OF PROCEEDINGS.

HOUSE OF DELEGATES.

WEDNESDAY, January 8, 1806. THE house met. Prefent as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read. A petition from the trustees of the poor of Prince-George's county was read and referred.

Mr. Montgomery delivers a bill, entitled, An act authoring the drawing of a lottery to defray the expence of building a masonic hall in the city of Baltimore; which was read.

The clerk of the fenate delivers the resolution in favour of Patrick Murdock, and the resolution in favour of Marsham Parker, endorsed, " diffented from.". The bill to alter and change, the name of Elizabeth Sower, endorsed, " will not pass." And a bill, entitled, An act to reduce into one the several acts of assembly respecting elections, and to regulate said elections, endorsed, "will pass;" which was read. Mi Borley delivers 2 report on the petition of

Marina Habe Balbar (ayou a symbol) Gae lead Mr. Higgins delivers a report on the petition of Anthony Fox, in his favour; which was read.

Mr. Van-Horn delivers a bill, entitled, An additional supplement to an act, entitled, An act to lay cut and establish a road from the city of Annapolis to the city of Washington, and to repeal the act therein mentioned; which was read the first and second time, passed, and, with the supplement to the act to lay out and make a public road from the Black-house in Harford county to interfect the Pennsylvania line, the bill to ratify and confirm the marriage articles made between Ely Dorsey, of Ely, and Araminta his wife, the bill for the benefit of Robert Williams, a free black man, and of his wife and children, the bill to lay out and streighten a road in Baltimore county, and the resolution in savour of Robert Halkerstone, fent to the fenate.

Mr. Scott delivers a bill, entitled, A supplement to an act, entitled, An act authorifing a lottery to raife a sum of money for repairing Shrewsbury church, in

Kent county; which was read. The hill to empower the justices of the levy court of Saint-Mary's county to aile's and levy annually a fum of money for the purpose therein mentioned, was

read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate. According to order, the house proceeded to the fecond reading of the bill to alter and amend that part of the constitution and form of government which fettles and ascertains the number of delegates of the city of Baltimore to the general assembly of this state, and the question was put, Shall the said bill pass? Determined in the negative-Yeas 2-Nays 62.

On motion, the question was put, That the following be agreed to? Ordered, That the Bill to alter and amend that part of the constitution and form of goremment which fettles and afcertains the number of delegates of the city of Balaimore to the general afsembly of this state, and which has been negatived by the house, be published with the votes and proceedings. Determined in the negative.

Mr. Kuhn delivers a bill, entitled, A further supplement to an act, entitled, An act to incorporate companies to make several turnpike roads through Bultimore county, and for other purposes; which was

The supplement to the act for the establishment of a new public road in Somerfet cornery, passed at November session, seventeen hundren ninety-eight, was read the second time, passed, and fent to the senate.

The clerk of the fenate delivers the bill for the Support of Covinton Jones and wife, endorsed, " will pass." The bill to provide for recording certain papers in the register's roffice in Dorchester county, endorled, "will pass with the proposed amendments;" which amendments were agreed to and the bill ordered to be engroffed. And a bill, entitled, A supplement to an act, entitled, An act to incorporate a company to make a turnpike road to lead from the emis roads near Richard Caton's limekile, in Baltiwore county nearly in the direction of Jones's Falls to the city of Baltimore, sudorfed, " will pass;" which was read.

The bill for draining part of a branch of Tuckahoe, known by the name of Beaver Dam Branch, lying in Queen-Anne's county, was read the fecond time, passed, and, with the bill to lay out, open and clear, a road in Harford county, from a place known by the name of Darlington, to interfect the road leading from Belle-Air to Havre-de-Grace, fent to the senate.

According to order, the house proceeded to the fecond reading of the bill to incorporate a company to make a turnpike road from the line of the district of Columbia, where it croffes the post-road leading from George-town to Frederick-town, through Montgomery and Frederick counties to Frederick-town, which being read throughout, the question was put, Shall the faid bill pass? Resolved in the affirmative.

A petition from David Hopkins, and a petition from fundry inhabitants of the city and county of Baltimore, were read and referred.

Resolved in the affirmative, year 31, nays 28.

SATURDAY, January 11, 1806.
THE house met. Present as on yesterday. The

proceedings of yesterday were read. The bill for the benefit of Charles Thomas Clarke and William Hall, was read the second time, passed, and, with the bill to prevent free negroes from felling any corn, wheat, tobacco or other articles, without having a licence for that purpose from a justice of the

peace, sent to the senate. The bill for the relief of John R. Caldwell. was read the ferond time, and the question put, Shall the faid bill pass? Determined in the negative.

The supplement to the act to streighten part of the road in Harford county which leads from Underhill's mill to the city of Baltimore, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

A petition from John Miller, of the city of Baltimore, for an act of insolvency, was read and referred. A petition from fundry inhabitants of Frederick, Montgomery and Baltimore counties, was read and

referred. Ordered, That the petition of John R. Caldwell rifing the truffees of the poor of Prince-George's for an act of infolvency, be referred to the general committee.

Mr. Jackson delivers a bill, entitled, An act relating to liawkers and pedlers; which was read.

The bill to change the place of holding elections in the fourth election district of Montgomery county, was read the second time and passed.

The clerk of the senate delivers the bill to establish permanent salaries for the judges of the six judicial districts in this state, endorsed, " will not pass." And a message on the subject thereof. Also the bill authorifing any two justices of the peace in this state to qualify the coroners of their respective counties, and the bill to alter the time of the meeting of the general affembly of this flate, severally endorsed, " will not pass." Also the bill to lay out and open a road in Baltimore county to interfect the main road leading from Cromwell's bridge to Baltimore, endorfed, " will pass with the proposed amendments;" which amendments were agreed to, and the bill ordered to be engroffed. And the bill to pravide for the organization and regulation of the courts of common law in this state, and for the administration of justice therein, endorfed, " will pals with the proposed

amendments;" which amendments were read.

The bill for draining part of a branch called Oldtown Branch, lying in the upper part of Caroline county, was read the fecond time and passed.

Ordered, That Mr. Bruce be added to the committee appointed on the petition for the extension of the Falls Tumpike.

The house proceeded to the second reading by elpecial order of the amendments to the bill for the organization and regulation of the courts of common law in this state, and the question was put, That the house agree to the first amendment? Resolved in the

affirmative—Yeas 43—Nays 14.

The residue of the amendments were agreed to
