From a New-York paper. BY THOMAS JEFFERSON, President of the United States of America.

A PROCLAM TION. Whereas fatisfactory information has been receivthat HENRY WHITBY, commanding a British amed vessel, called the Leander, did on the twentyfish day of the month of April last past, within the raters and jurisdiction of the United States, and near to the entrance of the harbour of New-York, by a annon that fired from the said vessel Leander, comon a murder on the body of John Pierce, a citizen of the United States, then pursuing his lawful vocabons within the same waters and jurisdiction of the United States, and near to their shores, and that the hid Henry Whitby cannot at this time be brought to justice by the ordinary process of law.

And whereas it does further appear that both before and after the faid day, fundry trespasses, wrongs and unlawful interruptions and vexations on trading resides, coming to the United States, and within their waters and vicinity, were committed by the faid armed rectel, the Leander, her officers and people; by one other armed vessel, called the Cambrian, commaded by John Nairne, her officers and people, and y one other armed sifel, called the Driver, com-monded by Slingsby Simpson, her officers and people, which veffels being all of the same nation, were aiding and affifting each other in the trespasses, interrupions and vexations aforefaid.

Now, therefore, to the end that the faid Henry Whithy may he brought to justice, and due punishbent inflicted for the faid murder, I do hereby especally enjoin and require all officers having authority, will or military, and all other persons within the lihis or jurisdiction of the United States, wheresoeor the faid Henry Whitby may be found now or breafter, to apprehend and secure the said Henry Whitby, and him fafely and diligently to deliver to the civil authority of the place, to be proceeded quink according to law.

And I do hereby further require, that the faid armed reffel, Leander, with her other officers and people, nd the faid armed veffols the Cambrian and Driver, heir officers and people; immediately and without any day, depart from the harbours and waters of the United States. And I to for ever interdict the entrance of all the harbours and waters of the United States to the faid armed veffels, and to all other vefkls which shall be commanded by the said Henry Whitby, John Nairne, and Slingsby Simpson, or cither of them:

And if the faid veffelt, or any of them, shall fail to lepart as aforesaid, or shall re-enter the harbours waters aforefaid, I do, in that cafe, forbid all mtercourfe with the faid armed vessels, the Leuder, the Cambrian and the Driver, or with any of them, and the officers and crews thereof, and do Medibie all supplies and aid from being surnished

them or any of them. And I do declare and make known, that if any person, from, or within the juris-dictional limits of the United States, shall afford any aid to either of the faid armed veffels, contrary to the prohibition contained in this proclamation, either. in repairing fuch veffel, or in furnishing her, her offer cers or crew, with supplies of any kind, or in any manner whatfoever, or if any pilot firall affift in navigating any of the faid armed veffels, unless it be for the purpose of carrying them in the flist instance, beyond the liouts and jurisdiction of the United States, such perion or persons shall, on conviction, fuffer all the pains and penalties by the laws provided for fuch offences: And I do hereby enjoin and require all persons bearing office, civil or military within the United States, and all others, citizens or inhabitants thereof, or being within the same, with vigilance and promptitude to exert their respective authorities, and to be aiding and affifting to the carrying this proclamation and every part thereof into full ef-

In TESTIMONY WHEREOF, I have caused the feal of the United States to be affixed to thefe presents, and figned the same with my hand. Given at the City of Walhington,
