BY HIS EXCELLENCY ROBERT BOWIE, GOVERNOR OF MARYLAND.

A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS it has been stated to me by the petition of a number of respectable persons, inhabitants of Prince-George's county, that a murder has been committed on the person of CHARLES NEVITT, junior, late of Prince-Georges county, by a certain negro man, slave of Basil Sopér, called WALL, who has since absconded and fled from justice: And whereas it is the duty of the executive to guard as much as may be against the commission of such enormities, and to bring such offenders against the laws and peace of society to justice, I have therefore thought proper to issue this my proclamation, and do, by and with the advice and consent of the council, offer a reward of ONE HUNDRED DOLLARS to any person or persons who shall apprehend and secure the said negro WALL in any gaol in the United States, so that he be brought to justice.

GIVEN in council at the city of Annapolis, under the seal of the state of Maryland, this sixth day of September, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and six.
