

The Senate shall ought to exercise its due weight in the selection. No less than two hundred and thirty persons have been named by you as trustees; for the Senate to accept the whole of your nominations, and agree to make none, can never be acceded to by this body. That the Senate should permit themselves to be tied down to a mere assent and negative to a bill containing such important measures and provisions as are contemplated by this bill, without exercising their judgment thereon, because the House of Delegates, by annexing a clause, appropriating money in the treasury, have made it a money bill, would be a dangerous precedent; it would be in the Senate a relinquishment of a right they possess, an abandonment of a duty constitutionally committed to them, and which they feel themselves fully competent to exercise. Conceiving therefore, that constitutionally the above details and regulations ought not to have been annexed to, and blended with, a law appropriating money in the treasury, we have negatived the bill and sent it back for your reconsideration, hoping sincerely that it may pass your House in such manner and form as that the Senate will be enabled to act jointly with yourselves in the details and regulations which they believe necessary to carry such law into advantageous effect. Be assured that the advancement of literature and the disseminating learning throughout the State, is regarded by the Senate as an object of the first importance and consideration, and they have the most earnest desire to co-operate with you in passing a law promotive of so important purposes; upon which they shall not be precluded from exercising their constitutional rights.

We have reconsidered the bill, entitled, a supplement to an act, entitled, An act authorizing a lottery to raise a sum of money to purchase a fire engine, and to purchase ground and build a school-house in Rockville, in Montgomery county, and have passed the same.

The bill to make public a road in Charles county, and the bill for the encouragement of mining, severally endorsed "will not pass." And resolution relative to the penitentiary and the petition in favour of Edward Roberts, endorsed "sent to."

The House resumed the consideration of the supplement to the act, for the relief of sundry insolvent persons, which was read throughout, passed, and sent to the Senate.

The question was put, That the bill to abolish all parts of the constitution and form of government as relate to the time and manner of electing a State, &c. be referred to the first day of June next. Resolved in the affirmative, yeas 29, nays 16. Resolved unanimously, That the thanks of this House be presented to Tobias E. Staunton, Esquire, in token of their approbation of his conduct in the discharge of his duty, impartiality and attention, in the discharge of the various duties assigned him, as speaker of this House.

The following resolution was assented to: Resolved, That the Governor and Council be authorized to furnish the House of Delegates with twenty-one convenient writing desks, with four separate drawers to each, for the use of the delegation from each county, and the delegation from the city of Annapolis and Baltimore, and that each desk be marked for the use of the particular county or city, and that the expence of providing the same be paid out of any unappropriated money in the treasury.

The House adjourns till to-morrow morning.

### IMPORTANT.

WASHINGTON, December 27.

Official letters have been recently received from General Wilkinson and Lieut. Shaw, both at New-Orleans. General Wilkinson has left the Sabine and gone to New-Orleans to defend that place. Colonel Cullum and the troops are marching after him with all possible speed. General W. writes that unless he is actually reinforced, New-Orleans will certainly fall before Colonel Burt. An attack is also apprehended from below. The letters came by water to Charleston, and thence by land. They refer to other letters not yet received, and hence it is supposed either that the mail has been stopped or that some treacherous postmaster opens all suspicious letters.—General Wilkinson and Lieut. Shaw give the same information. The letters are dated November 28. [U. S. Gaz.]

PHILADELPHIA, December 30.

The British packet Diana arrived at New-York, via Bermuda, which left Falmouth on the 12th ult. we have received LONDON PAPERS to the EIGHTH INCLUSIVE.—The latest date from the theatre of war is the 24th of October, on which day the French took possession of Berlin. The queen of Prussia had reached Stettin on the 19th.

Lord Morneth, the British minister to Prussia, had returned to London from Berlin, on the first of November, by the way of Hamburg.

A report of the re-capture of Buenos Ayres, had been received in England.—And on the 12th of November an expedition consisting of four fail of the line two frigates, a sloop of war, ten cutters, and 25 transports, provisioned for twelve months, and having on board 4000 troops, including cavalry, commanded by general Crauford, and the squadron by commodore Sir Robert Stopford, sailed from Falmouth.—Another expedition was fitting out at Margate and Ramsgate.

Advices from New-Orleans state, that the dread of an attack had occasioned an impressment of seamen to man the works around the city. [Phil. Pap.]

The Gallo Dutch army had taken possession of Embden, and it was expected they would march to Hamburg and Bremen.—The towns of Jena, Halle, Weimar, Naumburg, and other places have been burnt. [Ibid.]

### Dutch Spice fleet captured.

A letter dated Batavia, 24th Sept. 1806, says.—The Dutch spice fleet, from the Moluccas, bound for this place, has been captured by an English country ship and frigate. This fleet is valued at three or four million of Spanish dollars—a loss which must be seriously felt by the company, at this moment.
