A letter dated Batavia, 24th Sept. 1806, fays. the Dutch spice fleet, from the Moluccas, bound for this place, has been captured by an English country hip and frigate. This fleet is valued at three or four million of Spanish dollars a loss which must be feriously felt by the company, at this moment.
