So long as peace continues, they will obey the continued authorities of their country; but when that country shall let "flip the dogs of war," the Floridas must have a much abler and more numerous fet of foldiers than at present to defend them to preserve them from an immediate conquest.

It is most likely that our negotiations with Spain have been suspended by Buonaparte's visit to Poland; and that the result will not be ascertained until two or three months after his return to Paris [Enquirer.]
