RDERED, That the act, entitled, An act to prevent free negroes from felling any corn, wheat or tobacco, without having a licence for that purpose from a julice of the peace, and the Act to restrain the evil practices wrising from negroes keeping dogs, and to prohip them from carrying guns or offensive weapons, be published once in each week, until the first day of May next, in the Maryland Gazette, at Annapolis, the American and Federal Gazette, at Baltimore, the Republican Advocate, at Frederick-town, the Maryland Herald, at Hager's-Town, and Republican Star, at Easton.

An ACT to prevent free negroes from selling any corn, wheat or tobacco, without having a licence for that purpose from a justice of the peace.

WHEREAS great inconvenience is felt in this state in consequence of free negroes receiving stolen corn, wheat and tobacco, from flaves, and felling the fame as the production of their own labour ; therefore,

Be it enacted, by the general assembly of Maryland, That from and after the first of May next, no free negro shall fell any corn, wheat or tobacco, unless, at the time of his or her fo felling the faid article or articles, he or the shall be possessed of a certificate, under the hand and feal of a justice of the peace of faid

ion, and of good character, which ee force for one year, and no longer.

And be it enacted, That if any free negro shall act contrary to the provisions of this act, the perion to offending shall incur the penalty of five dollars for every such offence, one half to the informer, the other half to be applied to the use of the county, and to be recovered as other fines and forfeitures, before a juftice of the peace in the county where such offence hall-he committed

And be it enacted, That any person who shall purchase or receive from any free negro any corn, wheat or tobacco, contrary to the provisions of this act, shall forfeit and pay, for every offence, the fum of ten dol, lars, one half to the informer, the other half to be applied to the use of the county in which such oftence was committed, and to be recovered and applied in the same manner as other fines and forfeitures are by this law directed to be recovered and applied.

And be it enacted, That it shall be the duty of every justice of the peace, Theriff and constable, to give information of every violation of this act that shall come to his knowledge.

An ACT to restrain the evil practices arising from negroes keeping dogs, and to prohibit them from carrying guns or offensive weapons.

BE it enacted, by the general assembly of Maryland, That after the first day of May next, it flial not be lawful for any negro or mulatto within this state to keep any dog, bitch or gun, except he be a free negro or mulatto, and in that case he may be permitted to keep one dog, provided such free negro or mulatto shall obtain a licence from a justice of the peace for that purpose, and that the faid licence shall be in force for one year, and no longer; and if any dog or bitch owned by any negro, not possessed of fuch fibe lawful for any perion to kill the fame, and in cafe of any fuit instituted therefor, the person or persons killing the faid dog or bitch my plead the general if-

fue, and give the act in evidence.

And be it enacted, That after the faid first day of May next, it shall not be lawful for any free negro or mulatto to go at large with any gun, or other offenfive weapon; and in eafe any free negro or mulatto shall be feen going at large carrying a gun or other offenfive weapon, he shall be liable to be carried before any magistrate, in virtue of a warrant to be issued by any justice of the peace; directed to a constable of the county, and on conviction of baving violated the provilions of this fection of the act, fuch offender thall thereupon forfeit, to the use of the informant, such gun, or other offensive weapon, which shall thus have been found in his or her possession, and be subject to the payment of the costs which shall have accroading such profecution provided that nothing in this act shall extend to provided that nothing in this act shall extend to provide the free inegro or mulatto from carrying a gun, in other offensive weapon, who shall, at the time of his carrying the same, have a shall, at the sime of his carrying the same, have a certificate from a justice of the peace, that he is an greetly and peaceable person, which certificate shall he in force for one year from the date thereof, and no Honger.

And be it enacted, That it shall be the duty of the constable of every hundred to repair once a month, and oftener to information be given him of tumultuous meeting at mula of negroes of flaves, to all fuspected places within his hundred, and if he shall find now mulated and the stable for the stable of t find any mulatto or negro not a flave, at any fuch smeeting, it shall be the duty of the constable forthwith to carry such mulatto or negro, so offending, Defore some magistrate of the county, who shall thereo'spon commit fuch person to the common gaol, unless ne or she shall enter into a recognizance, with such security as faid justice. Thall require, for his or her good behaviour, and also to appear before the next county court, to answer for such offence in Juch manner as is prescribed by law for the trial of crimes and misdemeanors within this state, and if such person shall be found guilty of violating any of the provisions of this act, he shall be fined, or imprisoned, for such offence, at the discretion of the court; and if such constable shall find at any such meeting to aforesaid, any slave besides those belonging to the awifer of such place,

not having permission in writing from his owner, or overfeer, it shall be lawful for the constable and he is nereby authorised and required, to whip every such slave, at his discretion, not exceeding thirty-nine lashes.

And be it enacted, That before any conflable shall be entitled to receive the allowance granted by the fourth fection of the act, entitled, An act to prevent the tumultuous meetings and other irregularities of negroes and other flaves, he shall produce a certificate from at least two respectable citizens of his hundred, of his industry and fidelity in the discharge of his duty under this act and the act above recited.

And, for a further encouragement to take up runaways, Be it enacted. That in lieu of two hundred pounds of tobacco, allowed by the act, entitled, An act relating to servants and flaves, any person seizing and taking up fuch runaways, shall have and receive fix dollars.
